

Greetings in the Name of our Lord. I thank you for your continued support of ACLC activities throughout 2007 and I am also praying for 2008 to be a great year for all of us.

At the Conference for Women in Ministry held this past December in Norfolk, Virginia, a Native American, author of the book Pocahontas, shared how her people were liberated through Dr. Martin Luther King and the Civil Rights Movement. As ACLC holds its convocation in Los Angeles January 24 to 26, 2008, under the theme "God's Family Building The Kingdom" participants will be sharing and discussing how to build God's Family and God's Kingdom. According to Reverend Dr. Sun Myung Moon, when asked, "What is God's purpose for creating human beings"? He replied, "It is to experience joy through relating with ideal families filled with true love. To cultivate a character of true love was to secure a parent-child relationship with God, whereby God's children could live attending God as their Father." They were to follow the path of living as one family with God."

We are the people of God and God's family. ACLC is always seeking to promote action for building God's Ideal Family and God's Kingdom. Let us remember that ACLC's founding goal is to "Rebuild the Family, Restore the Community and Renew the Nation and the World."



Family Church of Peace Flag

Family Church of Peace Flag

Q: What is a Family Church of Peace Flag?

A: The Family Church of Peace Flag is a symbol of the new paradigm, where families will regain their proper position as a Blessed Central Family under the direct guidance of God.

Q: What does the symbol stand for?

A: The symbol on the flag represents the reconciliation of the family that was lost in the Garden of Eden. Every church or home that hangs this flag in a picture frame on their wall is making a bold statement that says, "When there is blessing and peace in families, there will be peace in the nations and the world."


The family unit is a husband and wife, father and mother, and children. From this sphere, a four position foundation is formed with God in the center. The family is the true image and likeness of God.

Q: Is this "Church"?

A: The flag says, "Family Church of Peace". The word "church" does not mean a building or institution. The word "church" comes from the Bible meaning which says, "He is coming back for a church without a spot or wrinkle." This means that He is coming back for a people that are God's family, not a building.

Q: Why should we hang a Family Church of Peace Flag?

A: A famous spiritualist gave the revelation that anyone who hangs a Family Church of Peace Flag in their church or home will parallel history. This act will be the equivalent of when God told the Israelites that whoever paints the blood of their lamb on their doorposts, the angel of death will pass over. This flag will not only bring blessings to your home, but will also bring you and your family good fortune and spiritual protection.


Apostle William McCoy

Walter E. Fauntroy



The Honorable Reverend Walter E. Fauntroy, a civil rights activist and former congressman, began his career when Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. appointed him as director of the Washington Bureau of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. Because of his personal commitment to the importance of unity and non-violence, he served as Dr. King's personal representative to Presidents John F. Kennedy and Lyndon Baines Johnson. This led to serving in the U.S. Congress for 20 years and cabinet level agencies of the Federal Government that had relevance to the civil rights struggle at that time. During his course of over 46 years as a Christian minister, he founded the New Bethel Baptist Church in 1986 where he is pastor

to this day. As director of the Washington Bureau of Dr. King's Southern Christian Leadership Conference, Mr. Fauntroy served as D.C. coordinator of the historic march on Washington for Jobs and Freedom in 1963 and coordinator of the Selma to Montgomery Voting Rights march in 1965 as well as the Meredith Mississippi Freedom march in 1966.


Rev. Dompreh gave an overview of his pilgrimage. He said that he was able to stand next to the very place where Jesus was born. He was



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




Red Dots indicate locations where ACLC Prayer Breakfast meetings have been scheduled.
