christmas banquet INTERNATIONAL ASSEMBLY


The Kabuki Theatre of Japantown came to life December 16th, 1972, as over 1,000 people participated in the Third Annual International Christmas Friendship Festival. "The purpose of the evening is to promote understanding and friendship," said general secretary for the evening, Michael Y. Warder.

Chairman of the event, noted business and civic leader Benjamin Swig, chairman of the board of the Fairmont Hotel, gave an inspiring welcome based on his remarkable life. Vice-chairman was Judge Joseph G. Kennedy. Chairman Swig stayed an hour after the program giving encouragement to the young people who worked on the evening and spoke on the importance of helping such causes.

Opening

The evening dramatized the family of nations with the spectacular opening flag ceremony when each flag of the 42 participating consulates was marched in. A thunderous ovation culminated with the arrival of "Old Glory".

Phyllis Yamato led the audience in "Let There Be Peace on Earth" accompanied by the New Age Orchestra of the International Re-Education Foundation, under the direction of Miss Nancy Radens.



Chaplain J.W. Betzold of the 6th Army gave the invocation for the evening. The roast beef dinner was cooked and served by members of the International Re-Education Foundation with Cecil Sala acting as advisor.

Sang Ik Choi, director of the executive committee, gave a brief greeting and spoke on the spirit of heart that had to characterize such a gathering if it was to be true.
