Isabelle Piolat, animator

Who are you and what do you do? My name is Isabelle Piolat, I'm 25, French, and I work in the animation industry.

How did you choose the profession you are in now? What's your background? I've always loved drawing, it's the way I can express myself best. At first I was intending to go into illustration, but I got accepted into an animation school in Roubaix, France, so I decided to give it a try. Animation is like giving life to an illustration. Working on rhythm and movement was new to me and I loved it! So I continued my education in Paris in a school called Les Gobelins, specialized in the technical aspect of making animated movies. I graduated in 2015.

What have you achieved in your career so far?

Since I only graduated recently, my main professional experience comes from my internships. One of the best experiences I've had so far was working with Michael Dudok de Wit on his feature film "The Red Turtle" (La Tortue Rouge). It's a contemplative movie

My work consisted of designing backgrounds, animals and props (items that appear in the movie) and animating some scenes.

The graduation movie I made together with four classmates, "The Last Day of a Condemned Man" (Le Dernier Jour d'un Condamné), has been featured at several international festivals, e.g. in Armenia, Morocco, Portugal, Belarus, Finland and Bulgaria.

Also, I just finished working as a freelance animator for a British feature film adapted from a graphic novel called "Ethel and Ernest". It's a nice family movie based on a true story.

What are you plans for the future? Any big dreams?


I'm not really sure how things will develop in my career in the future. I'd love to keep doing traditional 2D animation for auteur cinema (but sadly 3D is much trendier these days).

One of my dreams would be to spend a year in Japan and work with some talented people there. I'd also like to make my own short films, work on abstract films or contemplative films. Another one of my long-term dreams would be someday illustrate both children books and books for adults as well.
