ABOUT THE PROJECT

When a child receives basic education, they are more likely to avoid criminal activities, such as drugs and street violence.

More than 50% of children in public schools are considered to be failing. Due to a growing population of Jordanians and the influx of refugees, there has been tremendous pressure on Jordan's public education system, resulting in children, especially refugees, to fall behind. **However, you can make an impact on these refugee children!**

By donating to the Arabic Literacy Project, your contribution will allow the children to have the necessary attention to thrive. With a 1 to 5 teacher to student ratio, the classes provide the proper attention each of the students need when learning. With the goal to empower the refugee children in hopes of having a brighter future, the teachers provide the basic skills in Arabic, Mathematics, English at the 2 WFWP centers for after-school classes 5 days a week.
