Cheon II Guk Missionaries



After returning from Korea, the MITs and HUSA in training group attended a powerful Sunday service at Los Angeles Family Church and began their studying for their upcoming Divine Principle test through a Jeopardy game! Afterwards, they travelled up to the Bay Area where they immersed in a 4-day lecture training intensive led by Dr. Andrew Compton. Dr. Compton, working closely with Rev. Dunkley, shared the most updated Divine Principle content, and gave the participants ample time for lecture practice and question and answer sessions. They spent the afternoons

doing a clean-up project at the Bay Area Family Church and going witnessing at a local park, shopping plaza, and down town. In the evenings, they heard guidances from staff and joined the evening community prayer vigils where many participants shared powerful testimonies and reflections. The week concluded with collaborating for a local Unification Principles seminar with the community. 8 guests attended. Albania

In Albania, the team continued their CARP Talks with last week on gratitude presented by Taiyo and this past week on habits presented by Albijona, using the "cue, routine, reward" module to recognize negative habits and understand how to shift them into a positive force in their lives. Korean Class also restarted after a few weeks, hosted by Jongpil and Nori. Switching things up, Nori took the more advanced students to a separate level 2 lesson, while Jongpil took care of the main level 1 group. Utilizing their strengths to cover for each other, the event was a success. At total of 10 guests attended the event. Trying something new, last Sunday, the Vlore community held the first Sunday Service open to the public for guests to come since the team had arrived in January. In tandem with the 64th True Parents' Blessing Anniversary, Lubin gave a sermon on family values and how True Parents are upholding them in this more individualistic modern era. Serving traditional Korean and Albanian cuisine, the community enjoyed fellowship together in harmony. In all, 9 quests were present at the service. This week's Melodia e Pages event was held on the beach, with the topic of meditation and the importance of reflection and how beneficial it is to claim victories in our lives and find gratitude even in the most difficult of situations. They were given a set of questions to reflect on and later on share with one another. After the event, there was sports! A total of 9 guests came to the event.



For their most recent Peace Talk, the Austria missionaries had reading and discussion on "Where does value come from". Three new guests came and enjoyed discussion with other participants. They learned that value comes from God and they set some intentions for the week. This event was internally meaningful and a great opportunity to interact with others who are also interested in character education. They also had a brothers and sisters outings with guests and community members to bond and learn about the city where they are witnessing. Last Thursday, they held a Japanese cultural night where 2nd-year missionary, Joy A, introduced Japanese culture and prepared an activity of making "onigiri" (rice balls). Participants enjoyed the taste of Japan and experiencing a new culture. On Saturday afternoon, they bonded together with church members and guests through sports and conversations.



Poland

In Poland, the GPA team and Warsaw Chondo-so made their personal record in the number of workshops completed: 15 Introductions, 4 First Level/One-Day Workshops, and 3 Second Level/Three-Day Workshops. They also hosted an English Speaking Club, an evening event which includes a Hoon Dok Hwe reading and discussion, allowing guests to read and practice speaking English while also opening up about deep topics and our lives. Last Saturday and Sunday, the team had an actionizing program for guests to experience first hand what it's like to be part of the team. They received guidances on MMBK (fundraising) and Cheondo (witnessing), where they eventually walked out to the streets to approach people. Ju-Young also presented on lecture practice, so that the participants can get an idea of how they can practice giving lectures on principles. They got to have some fun icebreakers, sports, and eventually shared about their experiences at the end. After that, they went to the riverside to enjoy playing games and sports. Two of the participants

moved onto the Peace Embassy where they will begin their 7-day workshop.



Romania

On Friday, April 19th the Romania team held their first Texas culture night. The night consisted of a presentation given by Jonathan D. He shared fun facts about the state of Texas. Mina M. taught the participants how to do a traditional line dance. The team concluded the night by taking pictures in cowboy hats, teaching Texas slang, and eating a cowboy caviar dish with nachos. Here is a testimony from 3rd-year participant Jeong-Sook L.
