2023 BALKAN LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE: BALKAN LEADERS CALL FOR EU MEMBERSHIP

The latest Balkan Leadership Conference took place in the North Macedonian capital, Skopje, on October 14, 2023, with the theme "Western Balkans Integration into the European Union: Perspectives and Challenges." It was organized by the Europe-Middle East branch of UPF in partnership with the Podgorica Club, an organization founded in 2019 by former heads of state and government of Southeast Europe.

This was the third in a series of conferences jointly held by UPF and the Podgorica Club to discuss the war in Ukraine and its impact on peace and security in the Western Balkans. In response to the heightening conflict between East and West, the European Union has initiated a new dynamic for

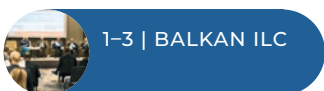
Western Balkans integration. However, the enlargement process has stalled. Balkan leaders have been expecting bolder steps from Europe, while there is a decline of euro-enthusiasm among Balkan populations.

The Skopje conference was attended by the current president of North Macedonia and ten former heads of state and government from Albania, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Croatia, Kosovo, Montenegro, North Macedonia, Serbia, and Slovakia. The president of the National Assembly and the minister of defense of North Macedonia also attended the event, as well as youth leaders from the six Western Balkan nations.

Introduced by H.E. Filip Vujanovi c,

president of the Podgorica Club and former president of Montenegro, North Macedonian President Stevo Pendarovski gave the opening address. He reminded the audience that this year was the 20th anniversary of the EU-Western Balkans Summit in Thessaloniki, Greece, whose goal was to speed up the integration of the Balkan countries in the EU. Apart from Croatia, that has not been realized.

Now the Ukraine war has put integration back on the EU agenda. In June the European Council decided to give candidate status to Ukraine and Moldova, whereas the process for Western Balkan countries is still at a standstill. Macedonian citizens are tired of staying in the waiting room of the EU, he said.

BALKAN CONFERENCE

SESSION 1: WESTERN BALKANS INTEGRATION INTO THE EU



The first session, “Perspectives on the Western Balkans’ Integration into the EU,” featured seven former heads of state and government who offered their views and recommendations. Branko Crvenkovski, a former president of North Macedonia, proposed a process of gradual integration before full membership in which new member states would not have the right of veto. The former president of Bosnia and Herzegovina, Mladen Ivanić, suggested that the process of integration could begin with agreements on inexpensive and uncomplicated measures, such as university accreditations or the elimination of roaming charges, or with considering a status similar to that between Switzerland and the EU. Igor Lukšić, a former prime minister of Montenegro, explained that the new EU membership policy will allow associated member states to align themselves with the EU Common Foreign and Security Policy, to have free movement of people, goods, services and capital, and access to EU development funds to overcome economic obstacles.

In a warning note, former Albanian President Alfred Moisiu, referring to the 24 September attack by Serb militants on police in North Kosovo, called for stronger security measures as a precondition for integration, while Fatmir Sejdiu, a former president of Kosovo, deplored the weak reconciliation processes among citizens and nations that cause problems in the Balkan region, as well as in Ukraine, Israel and Palestine.

Mikuláš Dzurinda, a former prime minister of Slovakia and president of the Brussels-based Wilfried Martens Centre for European Studies, acknowledged that the issue of EU enlargement is a vicious circle, but said he expected the December EU Summit to consider the accession of both Ukraine and Western Balkan countries. However, former Croatian President Stjepan Mesić expressed his concern that, instead of becoming EU members, they may end up with a kind of surrogate membership at the edge of Europe.

SESSION 2: PEACE AND RECONCILIATION IN THE WESTERN BALKANS

The second session was titled “Perspectives on Peace and Reconciliation in the Western Balkans.” Talat Xhaferi, the president of North Macedonia’s Assembly, emphasized that mutual parliamentary cooperation should be the stepping stone for reconciliation. But according to former Montenegrin President Filip Vujanović, coexistence and rebuilding trust should be emphasized, through economic cooperation and mutual recognition of diplomas. North Macedonian Defense Minister Slavjanka Petrovska warned that “by ignoring the sincere efforts made by our region toward integration, the EU may contribute to the rise of malicious influence from non-NATO countries.”

Former Albanian President Rexhep Meidani outlined several perspectives on EU-Western Balkan cooperation, such as NATO integration, diplomacy and mediation, or civil society organizations. Former Serbian Prime Minister Mirko Cvetković also emphasized that reconciliation will come only through greater involvement of the EU and major steps toward democratization within the region. In closing, former Austrian Defense Minister Werner Fasslabend said that the main danger in the Western Balkans is that 20 percent of the young people have left their country, and he suggested that the Podgorica Club take an active role in recommending corrective action.

SESSION 3: PROJECTS TO FOSTER REGIONAL COOPERATION IN YOUTH

The third session theme was “Policies and Projects to Foster Regional Cooperation in Youth and EU Integration.” Naumče Mojsovski, the director of the North Macedonian Agency of Youth and Sport, explained how the Berlin Process, set up in 2014 as a platform for high-level cooperation between the six Western Balkan nations, was enabling young people to take part in decision-making. Parliamentarian Fisnike Bekteshi Shaqiri emphasized that the region must be made attractive and inclusive so that young people remain and take their future in their hands. Indeed, according to Aleksandar Ružin, 155,000 Western Balkan youth left their countries between 2012 and

2022. Young people are the ones who open the doors for European values to enter the Balkans, said Albert Hani. But they should look to the future rather than dwell in the past. Dona Kosturanova, from the Westminster Foundation for Democracy, recommended further elaboration and financial support for youth strategies, as well as education in democratic and civic values. In conclusion, UPF senior adviser Dr. Michael Balcomb expressed his faith in the future of youth in the Western Balkans, despite the current challenges; but he emphasized that values such as dignity, integrity, kindness, or generosity should remain a priority.

INTERNATIONAL LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE CAMBODIA CELEBRATES “PEACE AND DEMOCRACY”

UPF was among the 61 international organizations that were invited to observe the election of members of the Cambodian National Assembly for the Seventh Legislature, which marked the 30th anniversary of the first general election held in 1993. On this occasion UPF, in cooperation with the Asian Vision Institute (AVI) and with the support of International Parliament for Tolerance and Peace, convened an International Leadership Conference in Phnom Penh, Cambodia, from July 21 to 24, 2023. The event was organized to support practical steps toward building a culture of peace, democracy, and good governance in Cambodia.

A total of 253 participants from 50 nations, including seven current and former heads of state and government, 45 parliamentarians and 15 organizational leaders, came together in person to deliberate on the theme “Peace and Democracy” and to be observers of Cambodia’s 2023 general election.

ILC Cambodia provided an ideal opportunity for UPF and AVI to further develop their partnership as they explored important projects with a special emphasis on the Asia Pacific Union initiative and Universal Peace Charter. Speakers from the EUME region included Hon. Dr. Werner Fasslabend, a former Austrian defense minister (1987-1990, 1990-2000), and Hon. Patricia Lalonde, a former member of the European Parliament (2017-2019) representing France.

UPF-AUSTRIA HOSTS EUROPE-BRAZIL DIALOGUE AT VIENNA UN

The event at the Vienna International Centre (the UN Office at Vienna) attracted approximately 150 participants.

Approximately 150 participants attended “Interdependence, Mutual Prosperity, Shared Values – Europe-Brazil Dialogue,” a conference that was held in the Vienna International Centre (the United Nations Office at Vienna) on November 8, 2023. UPF-Austria organized the one-day conference with the support of the Brazilian Embassy in Vienna, and in cooperation with Brazglobal, Abrasa Casa do Brasil Austria, the United Nations Correspondents’ Association-Vienna, the Coalition of Faith-Based Organizations, and Women’s Federation for World Peace, an organization that is affiliated with UPF. It was set up in connection with a two-day event titled “Industry 4.0, Renewable Energy and Green and Blue Hydrogen Energy between Brazil and European Stakeholders,” which was promoted by the Brazilian Global

“Justice for Peace: An Indissoluble Pair for a Harmonious Future” was a conference held in Rome on October 24, 2023, in the Capitular Hall of the Italian Senate. Sen. Manfredi Potenti organized the event in collaboration with the Italian chapters of UPF and its International Association of Parliamentarians for Peace. The event was moderated by Maria Pia Turiello, a forensic criminologist, who affirmed that, “True peace is not just the absence of war but a state of comprehensive, stable well-being that is difficult to achieve except through extreme and concerted efforts

aimed at removing the root causes of conflict.”

Speakers included senators, MPs, the vice chair of the Justice Commission, the deputy minister of justice, the deputy prosecutor of the Public Prosecutor's Office at the Cagliari Court of Appeals, a criminal lawyer, a former first executive of the State Police, an archbishop, and members of the National Forensic Council, the United Nations Interregional Crime and Justice Research Institute in Rome, and the United Nations Academic Impact.

UKRAINIAN ROUNDTABLE: LESSONS FROM THE WAR

UPF-Ukraine and the Ukrainian Peace Council (UPC) held a roundtable discussion on “Russia-Ukraine War: Lessons for Europe and the World” at the Drahomanov Ukrainian State University on November 3, 2023. Ukrainian scientists, educators, and journalists took part, as well as guests from several European countries. Dr. Volodymyr Lavrinenko, vice rector of the university, served as host. Former Minister of Education of Ukraine Dr. Mykhailo Zgurovsky, rector of the Igor Sikorsky Kyiv Polytechnic Institute and head of the UPC, gave his analysis on the war and said that the search for an effective security architecture was the main challenge for UPF, the UPC, and other peacekeeping organizations.

Other speakers included Dr. Vasyl Kremen, also a former

minister of education; Dr. Oleksandr Sagan, former head of the State Religion Department; Dr. Ruslan Khalikov, an expert from the Martti Ahtisaari Peace Foundation; Ambassador Valery Tsybukh, head of the Environmental Safety Council NGO; Tetyana Fedunova, head of the Association of Kyiv Schools; Ksenia Abramovych, a student and Youth Ambassador for Peace; and a five-member delegation from UPF.

The event was followed by a UPF Ambassador for Peace award ceremony, honoring 26 educators, school directors and teachers from the Peace School network developed by UPF-Ukraine.

PEACE PRINCIPLES SEMINARS AROUND THE REGION

UPF Peace Principles Seminars are held regularly in Europe and the Middle East for a half-day or a whole day. Here are some examples of recent events. An additional seminar was

held on 1 October in Hungary; 11 Ambassadors for Peace and four candidates attended the event at the Peace Embassy in Budapest.

Finland: A one-day seminar was held in Helsinki on 21 October with 33 attendees at the Cultural and Conference Hotel.



Sweden: The third Nordic Peace Seminar took place on 7 October in Stockholm at the Haymarket by Scandic hotel. Among the 60 participants from Denmark, Finland, Norway, and Sweden were religious leaders, academicians, artists, and NGO representatives.



United Kingdom: Dr David Hanna, UPF Northern Europe president, gave three presentations during a one-day seminar at UPF offices in Lancaster Gate, London, on 28 October.

Ambassadors for Peace and friends of UPF-Turkey gathered at UPF's Peace Embassy in Istanbul on October 21, 2023, to hold a roundtable on peacebuilding. UPF-Turkey President Binod Paudel called for a minute of silence for all those in the Middle East region who recently had lost their lives to war and natural disasters. David Fraser Harris, the

UPF secretary general for the Middle East, gave a brief account of UPF's humanitarian efforts in response to the earthquakes in Syria, Turkey and Morocco and the floods in Libya. He then read UPF's Response and Call to Action on Israel and Gaza.

Following a presentation by Jacques Marion, the co-chair of UPF EUME, about UPF's recent activities, each participant offered his or her perspective and ideas on contributing to the peace process at home and abroad. Participants included a journalist who played a key role in relief efforts in February's earthquake; a lawyer active with NGOs helping refugee children; a political advisor; a lecturer on human rights and diplomacy; several authors; and international business entrepreneurs. In his closing remarks, Umberto Angelucci, the UPF co-chair for the Middle East, emphasized the role Turkey can play in bringing peace to the region.

EUME SEASIDE SEMINAR PRESENTS UPF VISION

A PROPOSAL FOR THE RENEWAL OF THE UNITED NATIONS

The United Nations was launched with the splendid dream of realizing world peace. However, today it must admit its inherent limitations. As the world moved from the conflict-ridden 20th century toward a new millennium, the UPF founders, Dr. Sun Myung Moon and Dr. Hak Ja Han Moon, offered their vision for empowering the United Nations. Recognizing that one of the primary factors contributing to the emergence of conflicts was the deep-rooted disharmony that exists among the world's religions, they proposed, in a speech given at the United Nations on August 18, 2000, the creation of an Interreligious Council that would complement and support the Security Council in dealing with conflicts in the global era.



Excerpt from the Founder's Address for the Interreligious and International Federation for World Peace on August 18, 2000, at the United Nations Headquarters in New York

Proposal for a Bicameral UN Assembly

At their root, human problems are not entirely social or political, and so social and political approaches will always be of limited effectiveness. Although secular authorities rule most human societies, religion lies at the heart of most national and cultural identities. In fact, religious faith and devotion have far greater importance in most people's hearts than do political loyalties. [...] World peace can be fully accomplished only when the wisdom and efforts of the world's religious leaders, who represent the internal concerns of the mind and conscience, work cooperatively and respectfully with national leaders who have much practical wisdom and worldly experience about the external reality or "body." In this light, it is time for us to give serious consideration even to the prospect of restructuring the United Nations. For example, perhaps it is possible to envision the United Nations as a bicameral institution.

The existing United Nations structure, composed of national representatives, may be regarded as a congress where the interests of each member nation are represented. However, I submit that serious consideration

should be given to forming a religious assembly, or council of religious representatives, within the structure of the United Nations. This assembly or council would consist of respected spiritual leaders in fields such as religion, culture, and education. Of course, the members of this interreligious assembly will need to have demonstrated an ability to transcend the limited interests of individual nations and to speak for the concerns of the entire world and humanity at large.

The two chambers, working together in mutual respect and cooperation, will be able to make great advances in ushering in a world of peace. The wisdom and vision of great religious leaders will substantially supplement the political insight, experience, and skill of the world's political leaders.

Construction of peace zones in all border areas

Even at this moment, more and more conflicts are breaking out across the world over disputed borders. As a result, the world is sustaining substantial loss of human life. [...] I propose today that the United Nations and religious leaders join their hearts and work to create peace zones in areas of conflict. [...] These zones could be governed directly by the United Nations. [...] The United Nations will be responsible for providing guidance to those living in these areas so that they come to embody the founding ideals of the United Nations and comply with its declarations for peace.

CANADA-EUME WEBINAR: INSIGHTS INTO N. KOREA

The sixth in an ongoing series of webinars held jointly by UPF-EUME and UPF-Canada on the theme “Viewing the DPRK (North Korea) from Within” took place on 7 September 2023. The panel, from Europe, North America and Korea, attracted participants from around the world.

The keynote speaker was Professor Han Park, professor emeritus of international affairs and founding director of the Center for the Study of Global Issues at the University of Georgia in the United States. A specialist on North Korea, which he has visited over 50 times, he was instrumental in aiding the visits to that country of former U.S. presidents Jimmy Carter and Bill Clinton.

The audience then heard from three respondents. Paul Tjia, director of GPI Consultancy in the Netherlands, a businessman with extensive experience in the DPRK since 1997, spoke of the importance of developing a relationship with the North Koreans. Dr. Thomas Ward, provost and professor of peace and development studies at HJI Graduate School for Peace and Public Leadership, spoke about Juche Thought and its distancing from Dialectical Materialism. Finally, UPF International Chairman Dr. Chang Shik Yang spoke about the international efforts of UPF and its founders to bring the two Koreas into a healthy and constructive dialogue.

RUSSIA

In Russia, the head of UPF for Eastern Europe was one of the invited guests at events organized by the North Korean Embassy. The program on July 27, 2023, commenced near Moscow's Red Square, where 30 prominent figures from academia and NGOs laid flowers at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier as a tribute to the victims of the war. Following a meeting at the residence of North Korean Ambassador Shin Hong Chul, a conference took place at the Institute of Oriental Studies of the Russian Academy of Sciences with Dr. Alexander Vorontsov, director of the institute's Korea-Mongolia Department, and Dr. Felix Kim, president of the Russian North Korean diaspora association Bomminryon. DPRK Ambassador Shin provided insights into the historical aspects of the Korean War as viewed from the North Korean side.

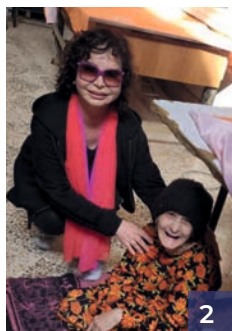


AID TO EARTHQUAKE VICTIMS IN ALEPPO, SYRIA

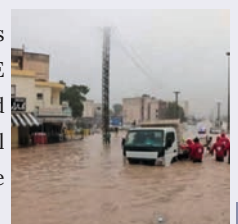

UPF-Denmark commemorated International Day of Peace on 24 September at Christiansborg Palace, the seat of the Danish Parliament. The audience of about 200 included leaders, Ambassadors for Peace, among others. Christian Friis Bach, an MP, former undersecretary-general of the UN and chairman of the UN Economic Commission for Europe (2014-2017), hosted the celebration. In his opening speech he referred to the Sustainable Development Goals and stressed the importance of UPF’s work to bring peace, which “comes from within and from beneath (from the grass roots).”

Other contributors were Yildiz Akdogan, a member of the Copenhagen City Council and a former MP, who moderated the second part; Jesper Dalgaard Pøhler, a

project manager at Aalborg University; Alexandra Hasdorf from Kaospilot leadership training, a former chair of the National Association for Eco-Communities; Anders Holst Bodin, head of the Climate Academy; and Helle Solvang, founder of the Lovesoil Learning Lab & Media Platform, Jordens Skole.

A peace ceremony was held in which seven representatives of the world’s religions gathered in silence and prayer before pouring water into a common bowl to the sounds of Mozart’s Ave Verum Corpus, symbolizing peace and harmony among people of all faiths. Musical interludes were provided by Søren Lee, one of Denmark’s most talented jazz musicians and composers, and Jazzmosphere with Metta Carter, Søren Lee and Maciej Szymczynski.

UPF FRANCE FOCUSES ON AFGHANISTAN

To commemorate the UN International Day of Peace, UPF-France held an event on the theme “Afghanistan: Current Situation, Perspectives for Building a United and Prosperous Country.” The event at the Paris Peace Embassy on 21 September was held jointly with Afghan Peace Dialogue, an organization led by a young Franco-Afghan, Reza Jafari, a UPF Ambassador for Peace who spoke about his efforts to bring Afghan political players to the dialogue table.

Patricia Lalonde from the Geopragma Institute, a former MEP, testified to her extensive work in support of Afghan

women’s education since the 1990s. Dr. Ali Rastbeen, president of the Académie de Géopolitique de Paris, gave a sharp analysis of the Taliban regime in the current international context.

Albania — More than 150 people, including the mayor, prefect and district head, attended a UPF event in the town of Peshkopi, which featured many performances.



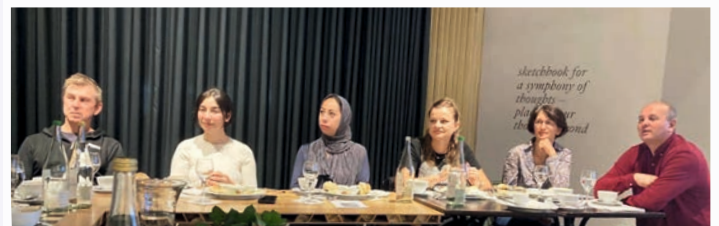
