Reusable menstrual pads are made by volunteers at the Days for Girls Wandin East Chapter. We are so inspired by Lorena Hayes who oversees the team and lovingly prepares the beautifully coloured kits to be used by women and girls in developing nations. WFWP Solomon Islands volunteers will teach girls about menstrual health and hand out the pads at local schools. The sewing machines will be used by the New Hope Academy in their technology department to teach high school students the art of sewing.

It was a beautiful summer morning in the Melbourne Hills for our volunteers to gather for a half day of boxing good quality second hand items ready for shipment to the Solomon Islands. A big thank you to our wonderful volunteers who sourced used boxes and spent their Saturday preparing 33 boxes of goods to be picked up for delivery to the shipping warehouses.

The children's books will go to augment the New Hope Academy school library and laptops will be used by teachers at the school.





A big thank you to Doug's Mini Movers who has been supporting WFWP for the past seven years. Doug and his team pick up our boxes and transport them free of charge to shipping company warehouses, where goods are bundled together in containers and then loaded onto ships ready for port departure.

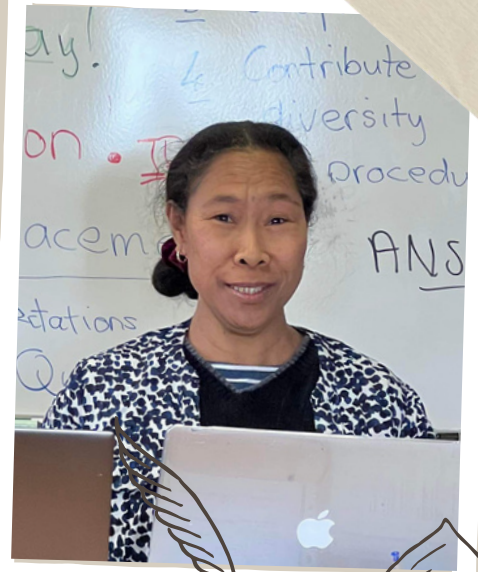

Because compared to the life level of standard from Western Countries to some Pacific Islanders are not the same. So growing up in my country in the rural area wasn't easy. We don't have much resources and materials to see, receive and use. When I came to Australia to work as a full time staff to our church I always watched children going to school, having good food, wearing good clothes and this makes me feel sad. That's when I thought when I finished from the church I wanted to study to become a kindergarten teacher. I was still working for the church in 2020, I enrolled in Greenwich College to study English. After Learning English for 6 Months, Extended to another 3 months in the same college to do Cambridge, and to practice for the IELTS test, In the end of 2021 I did the IELTS test from Greenwich College.

I enrolled at SCSCC Community College to Certificate 111 with self sponsoring. While I was still doing Certificate 111, I was offered a job from my aassesor friend Early Learning Child Care Center. So when I finished my Certificate 111 and got my Certificate, I just continued working as a casual and last June I was employed as a part time permanent staff.



Feb 2023

I decided to continue to do a diploma. Due to the restrictions from the migration laws students were unable to work long hours. That's when I ask for assistance. Thank you for believing in me and accepting my request to pay off my remaining tuition fees. Soon I will graduate. Anyway, becoming a student is not easy here in Australia. However, If it's in God's will, things will happen naturally. I believe in God and I have few people who have supported me including WFWP Oceania. They have supported me in many ways, not only financially. I started working 2 jobs when I became a student, but due to covid everything changed.

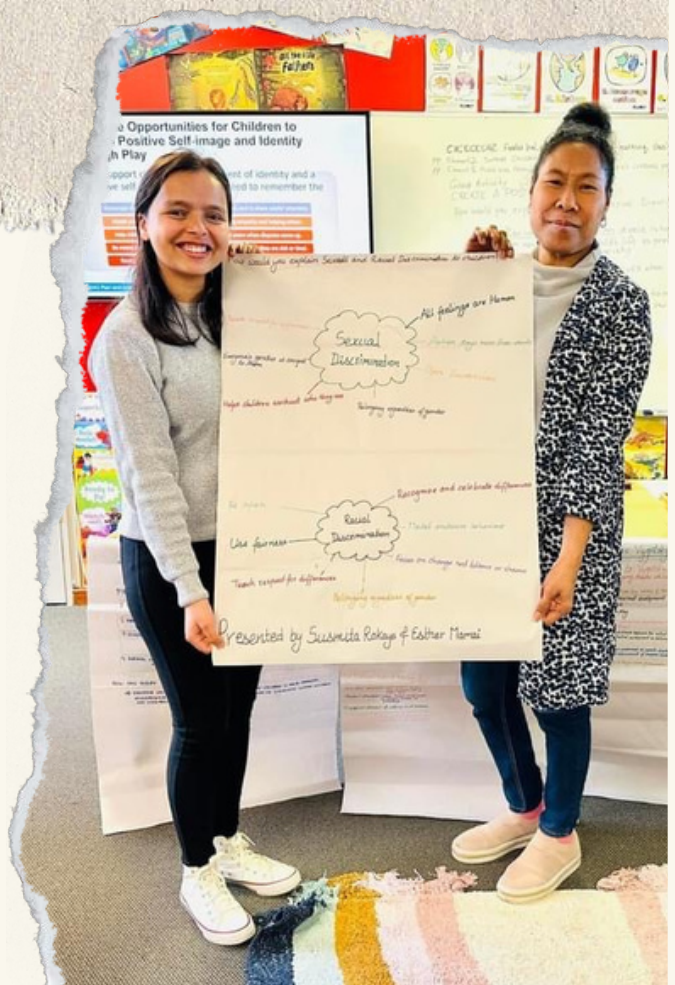
My dream

is to open a kindergarten school at my Village to support the children and teach them at an early age so that they can think and understand why education is very important. I want to make sure the children are well taken care of, and teach them the good things and also apply what I have learned from here in Australia and also to become an independent not to rely on somebody else. The NSW Chapter of the Women's Federation for World Peace (WFWP) orchestrated a captivating 'Her Story' presentation, commemorating International Women's Day within the framework of GWPN initiatives. Hosted in Sydney, the event resonated with the overarching theme of this year's International Women's Day, 'Inspiring Inclusion'. Against the backdrop of personal narratives, three esteemed



guest speakers illuminated the concept of inclusion through the lens of their own life journeys. Furthermore, the event fervently endeavoured to embolden the next generation of young women, facilitated by

the guidance of a youthful educator and a high school student. The presence of thirty enthusiastic attendees emphasised the event's mission to empower and inspire. Each speaker's account bespoke of arduous journeys towards their present triumphs, imbuing the audience with profound inspiration.



A transitional passage from one generation to the next is akin to a relay race, wherein the baton of wisdom and experience is passed on. This event served as a symbolic relay baton, facilitating an exchange of insights and encouragement between generations. It is undeniable that the narratives of overcoming adversity — whether stemming from the ravages of war, genocide, refugee crises, or domestic turmoil — wield a profound impact on the younger cohort. These testimonies serve not only as reminders of resilience but also as beacons of hope, illuminating pathways to happiness and achievement amidst the challenges of life.

PRESENTERS

DR TUONG PHAN - ACADEMIC PROFESSOR



Dr. Phan has devoted her career to the esteemed realms of academia within Australia and New Zealand's higher education sector, focusing her scholarly pursuits on the vital arenas of public health advancement and mental illness diagnosis. Upon her arrival in Australia via a humanitarian program for political refugees arriving by boat, she candidly shared the formidable obstacles encountered during her assimilation and the unjust tribulations endured as a woman. With a profound insight, she under-

scored the transformative potency inherent in assuming personal responsibility, industrious perseverance, and self-evolution as indispensable catalysts for realising gender parity.

YULIANA FRANCIE - AUTHOR AND SPIRITUAL MENTOR



Yuliana is dedicated to guiding driven women to unlock their full potential, elevate their vitality, and attain extraordinary success while remaining authentic to themselves. During her presentation, she recounted her journey through divorce, single parenthood, financial struggles, and the ensuing depression. However, she found her authentic identity by defying societal norms. She emphasised, "We foster a brighter future when we empower others to recognize and appreciate the significance

of women's inclusion. When women feel empowered to participate, they experience a profound sense of belonging, relevance, and empowerment."

DEMILA GABRIEL - AMBASSADOR FOR WOMEN'S AND CHILDREN'S RIGHTS, MEMBER OF THE UN WOMEN'S COUNCIL



Demila, a refugee who sought refuge in Australia following displacement due to the Bosnian and Herzegovinian war, is fervently dedicated to combating domestic family violence, safeguarding the rights of women and children, and alleviating poverty. With poignant candour, she shared her firsthand experiences of war's horrors and the enduring trauma endured by refugees. Stressing the paramount importance of extending assistance to refugees with dignity and a profound respect for diverse

cultures, religions, and Indigenous peoples, she champions a compassionate approach. Additionally, having faced domestic violence herself, she recounted her journey of seeking protection and now channels her experiences into community advocacy as an ambassador for the Women's and Children's Shelter.

January 22 | Honiara, Solomon Islands



My first semester of university has provided me with many challenges and lessons, not only for my university career, but for the rest of my life. The fact that



this semester of college is already over seems surreal. I was nervous but excited during the orientation sessions. It seems like it was only yesterday. The first semester of studying combined degrees of the Bachelor of Arts/ Bachelor of Law flew by.

As I reflect on these months, I recall telling myself, at least once a week, that I wanted to drop out of school. The thoughts were followed by breakdowns, crying fits and

calls of defeat. The past few months haven't been at all easy. There were times I thought I wasn't intelligent enough to attend university. I was constantly engulfed in a swarm of stress.

The work load is greater than I expected. It took a significant amount of time to adjust to all of the assignments, reading and writing requirements. Managing a laptop with a flat battery, along with other technical problems, added to the workload. With the 2023 Pacific Games rapidly approaching, I also needed a great deal of planning and flexibility to support this event. For several months, there was a daily power outage in Honiara, Solomon





Islands. It lasted at least five to six hours a day, due to the preparations and modifications implemented. As a student, using a laptop with technical problems is difficult, especially because most classes and courses are now offered online rather than in-person. It is challenging when there is a power outage every day, and you are trying your best to study.

Even though I had no idea what I would be learning, I knew that I wanted to learn as much as I could. I'm relieved this class wasn't just about law simulations and mock trials. This semester I learnt about new and important topics. My perspectives on Law and Arts have evolved as a result of studying this course.

More significantly, I discovered that you can never be sure what challenges life will present. I've discovered that it's not always fun and games. There will be times when you realize the benefits of spending time alone. There will be days when you are up at two in the morning because you have three examinations the next day. I've learnt from my first semester that while there are plenty of wonderful things about attending college, it's also okay if things don't turn out the way you had hoped. Unexpectedly, you will meet new people, live new experiences, and create new memories.

Even though this semester was one of the most challenging aspects of my life, I'm not upset about it at all. Considering how successfully I've adapted to this new academic environment and knowing that I can make it through the remaining years ahead, gives me a sense of empowerment and hope. Learning how to train your ear to certain intervals and dissonances takes a fair amount of practice and patience. Nevertheless, the knowledge I have acquired is worthwhile, despite all the stress and sleepless nights. I've developed new modes of thinking and am aware of the advantages of practice, diligence, and resilience.

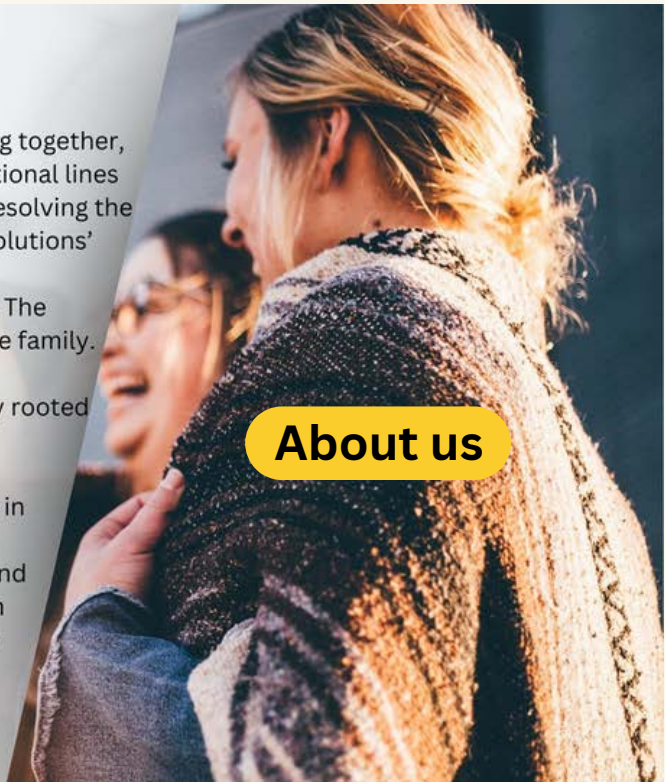


MISSION AND VISION

Before adjourning for lunch, the participants took turns to present cultural performances. This included an array of Malaysian folk songs, as well as traditional Korean and K-Pop music. Participants also exchanged gifts during the session.



During the second half of the program, participants visited the Jadi Batek factory for a traditional Batik colouring class. They were fascinated to learn about its history and process of making Batik. It is a method of decorating fabric by applying hot wax and dye. Each participant unleashed their creativity by decorating the flowers on the batik fabric with a variety of rich, vibrant colours.

WFWP Malaysia was honoured to take part in Malaysia's national celebration of International Women's Day, hosted by the Ministry of Women, Family, and Community Development.
