Hoon Dok Tradition the Key to Bringing Victory

Some brothers and sisters don't have to be told there's a national witnessing condition to get motivated and have been reaching out to new people for years.

Take Mrs. Eva Ozaki in Laurel, Maryland. She has brought six spiritual children over the years, including Alie Koroma, whose testimony was published on Familyfed.org/members on June 12, 2013. In 2012, Ozaki made a determination to give out 240 of True Father's autobiographies, and she gave one to Mr. Koroma, 23, in late June, 2012. She didn't re-contact him until March, 2013, but when she called him, he told her that he had read the book and was very inspired by it. Today, Mr. Koroma is continuing his study of Divine Principle and taking an active part in building the local Unificationist community.

Ozaki credits her daily reading of *Hoon Dok* materials for giving confidence. "Conditions I believe helped me a lot. They gave me conviction and power to witness," she told Unification News. She says that after attending a seminar given by Mr. Hiroshi Inose, Kodan leader, in June of 2012, she started to read *Hoon Dok Hae* materials over and over. Ozaki says one of her favorite quotes is from True Father's speech on July 24th, 2010 in New York. "You should set up the *Hoon Dok Hae* tradition in your families using the books I have mentioned. That is the tradition where three generations in your family start each day by reading Heaven's word, and lead a life of practicing what they read with a new heart...Once that happens, no matter how hard Satan may try to worm his way in, to infest your lineage, once he encounters the *hoon dok hae* tradition, he will find no room to move."

Ozaki added: "Whoa these are powerful words: with Hoon Dok Hae, Satan cannot infest your lineage. That gives me so much hope. There is something I can do to ward off Satan. That is why I make all these study conditions, right now on the individual level, but ultimately as a whole family and I am working on that."

She goes on to say in her email to Unification News:

"After getting guidance from Mr. Chaen Masaaki, a missionary to the Commonwealth of Dominica, she started to read Hoon Dok Hae materials over and over.

She continues to say in her email to Unification News: "I asked him, 'When I read God's word quickly and loudly every day? I don't understand everything that I am reading.

He said' That that is not the important thing. What is important is that you are giving food to your spirit body and it will grow through that.' And I can testify to that. I have become stronger internally, more confident in who I am, who TRUE PARENTS are, how they have changed my life, and given me my family.

For me, Hoon Dok Hae changes everything. It is the source of my life energy. That's why I make these conditions, because God gives me His love, His wisdom, His Life force to become the person He wanted me to be."

"At a seminar given by Rev. Hiroshi Inose last January, we received Father's Speech, 'How to Witness to State Leaders, (April 1, 1977). He urged us to read it 33 days in a row, I did," she wrote.

"I decided to do this because I wanted to inherit Father's heart of witnessing. You may ask why so many times?

"Inspired by Mr. Chaen's testimony, I had read Mrs. Eu's one-hour and three-hour lecture one hundred times and I am now reading the six-hour lecture for the tenth time, aiming to accomplish reading it one hundred times. Once you read God's Word one hundred times, you really feel it's getting into your blood. It feeds your spiritual mind. It takes a lot of discipline, but the results are incredible," Ozaki said.

The following passage from a letter urging Hoon Dok Hae by Rev. Chung Shik Yong, the continental director of South Asia, was cited by Ozaki as a source for her inspiration to do Hoon Dok Hae daily.

"The members who devote themselves to Hoon Dok Hae come to meet God, feel the spirit world, experience the heart and anguish of True Parents, and know the taste of the Word. As True Parents have always said to us, like a honeybee that clings on to honey even when its body is pulled off because it has come to know the taste of honey, those at the scene can see for themselves that the people who come to know the taste of Hoon Dok Hae can never be pulled away. At present, many members in Asia have caught this Hoon Dok virus, and not only men and women of all ages but also Ambassadors for Peace and, furthermore, very young second generations, are addicted to Hood Dok Hae. As can be seen, a new Hoon Dok Hae revolution is taking place. The Kingdom of Heaven has been a vague idea for us until now, but we have come to realize that our spiritual selves are perfected and the Kingdom of Heaven realized on earth through Hoon Dok Hae."

Ozaki, originally from Austria, grew up in Neudorf, a small town 45 minutes drive east of Vienna. She joined the Unification Church in Brussels in 1978 and came to the United States in 1980. She says she loved serving on Mobile Fundraising Team (MFT) for seven years. "I must say, it saved my life. I learned that I had to be united with my central figure in order to get result," she said.

The Ozaki family works on tribal messiahship by visiting friends and family in Neudorf every year. Amy and Lisa, their two daughters act as the good will ambassadors to relatives, often giving them neck massages and singing Japanese songs for them. "I blessed 25 families in 1997, even though my sister was upset about this," and today, she still keeps up a correspondence with 10 of these families.
