Sankhu, Nepal -- The former Prime Minister of Nepal, H.E. Madhav Kumar Nepal, emphasized that his country needed to protect their valued family traditions where three or even four generations living together is normal.

Other members of parliament who spoke echoed these concerns. Two-time Minister of the Government of Nepal, Hon. Ek Nath Dhakal, highlighted the importance of lineage, saying, "A good lineage is an asset to the nation; a bad lineage full of promiscuity, prostitution, alcohol abuse and criminality is a burden to society."
