The following is a letter addressed to The Editor of "The Daily News", Tarrytown, N.Y.

October 1, 1973

Dear Sir,

I would very much appreciate it if you could kindly give consideration to the following letter and have it published in your esteemed newspaper.

I was one of the British Students on the Internationl Leadership Course held this summer by the Unification Church of America. I would like to express my views on the course and on my stay for I understand there has been adverse criticism on the part of some students.

I feel that we, British students, should be grateful for the unique opportunity of spending 40 memorable days in America, all expenses paid, for the meagre contribution of 10 pounds.

I, personally, met many interesting people. I was moved by the warmth of the hospitality given me and I certainly did have a most profitable time.

I was impressed by the lectures delivered by highly-qualified professionals from well-established institutions, like the M.I.T., West Point Academy and other Universities. A variety of subjects of topical interest were introduced to us and the discussions that followed were quite stimulating.

The main aim of the course was to present us with a new ideo logy. The Unification Church made its position very clear: It is against communism mainly because this system denies the existence of God, denies a spiritual dimension to human existence and the freedom of the individual to lead an authentic, religious life.

What the Unification Church proposes is a systematic way of life based upon Love of God and love of the neighbour. This is not very new but what is new is the claim to establish God's kingdom on earth here and now through association with a central figure who, directly centred on God, receives revelations as to how this kingdom can be established. It is not as simplistic as it all sounds. I am sure qualified representatives of the Unification Church are prepared and willing to further elucidate their position and support their claims publicly. The very near future will show, I feel certain, that this is the power to change the course of human history. Marxists know it and I am not at all surprised that they find in the Unification Church a major threat, the most serious challenge in fact to any atheistic ideology.

The Church teaches that each individual, given the proper context, can experience a direct relationship with God. There is nothing inconsistent in the idea that God can send us His Spirit in order that we may be restored to His Spirit. We are made in his image

and likeness and it is common knowledge that a truly God-centred life, supported by intense prayer and mortification, can give rise to mystical experiences. Such experiences are spiritual in nature, they are very subjective and transcend the rational mind. As such, the language that aims at their transcription can only be tentative approximations and analogies. This in itself in no way invalidates the experience. An experience that takes place beyond the realms of discursive thought needs a new language for its transcription and a new language for its proper investigation. I am not at all sure, therefore, from my contact with the other students on the course, that any of us was qualified, nor adequately equipped, to assess the real validity of the experiences reported, to pass a categorical value judgment on their tenour or to pronounce himself definitively on those who claimed to have them.

I think that a wholesale condemnation of the Unification Church and of the course held is most unfair and does not at all represent the opinion of all the British Students who attended. There is no justification whatsoever for such an ingratitude on our part, ingratitude which can only serve to impair our relationship with America.

I am not a member of the Unification Church. I do not pretend to be a qualified judge of spirituality. I am only a Student engaged in research on the supernatural element; I am hoping to finish a Ph. D. thesis on this subject next year. My main claim, however, is simply an honest desire to give credit where it is due, a sincere hope to see justice done.

### INTERNATIONAL LEADERSHIP SEMINAR BRITISH AND JAPANESE STUDENTS JOINT CONFERENCE at Estes Park, Colorado, U.S.A. August 26, 1973

### JOINT COMMUNIQUE

Japan, the bearer of Oriental culture in the modern age, and Britain, the mother country of democracy based on Christianity in the western world, are two nations of great importance today because of their key positions in East and West respectively and their decisive role in determining the fate of Asia and Europe in the future. Representing these two nations, 65 Tokyo University students and 85 students from Oxford, Cambridge and other British Universities - future leaders of their countries - were invited to the United States of America, the leading country of the Free World, to attend the "International Leadership Seminar" held in San Francisco and New York respectively for 40 days in July and August, 1973, to afford students an opportunity to discuss various problems of Christianity, democracy, Communism, etc., and to search for the possibility of building a peaceful, united world.

In the seminar many lectures were given by prominent American professors and scholars in a variety of fields, and a new value-oriented world-view called "The Divine Principle" was introduced. The students' reaction to the ideas of the Divine Principle varied from positive interest to indifference and negative rejection. Nevertheless, most students were deeply impressed and inspired by the young members of the host organization, who were working devotedly for the cause of bringing happiness and genuine peace to mankind as a living reality in people's lives, guided by an understanding of the Divine Principle. The faith and dedication of the staff members to teaching the Divine Principle led the students to think that there might be in the Divine Principle a new possibility of saving their countries and leading the future world.

Throughout the seminar, the student participants found the programs to be of much significance and value, although some did not. All the participants certainly learned many new things and had a very pleasant time throughout the seminar. Some students came to recognize the necessity of making further efforts to take responsibility for the future leadership of Asia and Europe by becoming the best models for the young generations of their own countries.

In the last part of the seminar, the students of both countries as well as many American student members of the host organization met together at Estes Park, Colorado. At a joint conference held on August 25, 1973, the students had discussions on such themes as:

- 1. How to deal with the Christian crisis
- 2. The future of Communism
- 3. The possibility of establishing world unity.

### Joint Communique

As for the first theme, it was pointed out that, among the many critical problems in the present world, such as pollution, overpopulation and the shortage of natural resources, the most serious one concerns the crisis in man's spiritual condition caused by the decline of the Christian spiritual basis of today's world civilization. It was also noted that the cause of the crisis lies in man's own nature and that Christians should participate more actively and positively in the efforts to solve the problems of the world by carrying out the Christian teachings of God's love in the practical concerns of the world.

With respect to the second and third themes, it was pointed out that Communism can never solve the essential problems of man because Communism puts emphasis on the material aspects of social life and ignores man's spiritual nature. It was further concluded that the main reason for Communism's success in expansion is not the validity of its ideology but the failures and defects of the Free World.

As for the possibility of establishing world unity, opinions were expressed that it is desirable to build a world family without national barriers and that it is necessary to make practical efforts, step by step, to establish friendly relations among all the nations of the world.

The participants agreed that this kind of joint conference is very significant and that it is necessary to make further efforts to consider these problems more positively in the days ahead.

Finally, all the participants expressed deep gratitude to the American professors and scholars for their instructive lectures, to the staff members of the host organization for their kind service and hospitality, and to the leaders of the Unification Church in many countries, whose efforts made possible the great success of the seminar as a whole.

The Bible as seen by Rev. Moon

Speaking in Korean. most of the time in a very loud voice which sometimes fell to a whisper, and at times pounding the lectern and shaking his interpreter, Unification Church founder Sun Myung Moon delivered his interpretation of the Bible to a Carnegie Hall audience Monday night.

ALTHOUGH the first of three scheduled lectures by Rev. Moon was reportedly sold out and the orchestra level of the New York City hall was filled, there were few people in the balconies. Many left after the first hour of the two-hour long lecture, but a large majority of the audience, which included church members as well as the general public, stayed to hear the end.

The lecture traced the history of man's relationship with God, as interpreted by Rev. Moon, leading to the church's belief that the world is in the time of the second coming and that a new Messiah will appear. Many church members believe Sun Myung Moon is himself the Messiah.

The relationship between man and God is best demonstrated in the relationship between father and son, Rev. Moon said.

"Why do we want to become his children?" he asked. "Because there is no more precious love than the love he can give his children."

Rev. Moon said Adam and Eve were the first parents and ever since they fell God has been trying to restore the original perfect family.

"When the fall came to human history it was the parents, the mother and father, who fell," he said. "In order to restore the world you must restore the same fallen thing which is the parents.

"Therefore we need a saviour who will bring us back to the true mother and father position."

Jesus came to restore the original family

and the people of Israel were chosen to be that family, Rev. Moon said. But Jesus failed, Rev. Moon said, because "he lost his nation, his family, and he had nothing left to work with.

"If the nation of Israel had become one with Christ it could have marched and conquered Rome. The purpose of Jesus was to bring perfection to the nation but finally he was persecuted and he was nailed to the cross."

According to Rev. Moon, Christianity emerged as the second nation of Israel but it represents only the spiritual salvation of man and not the physical salvation.

THE CHRISTIAN family is waiting for a new Messiah and, he said, the new Messiah will not, as many Christians believe, be "coming from a cloud in the sky."

"If he came back in a cloud from heaven how could he deal with the world we have," Rev. Moon asked. "The Messiah must come back as the third Adam."

"It is God's greatest hope and divine will to create a world only controlled by God." Rev. Moon said.

"We know we are the manifestation of

God's ideal. It is God's intention to unify us as one object of love, life and ideal. The time has come to prepare for the lord of the second advent and Unification Church was born to perform that purpose."

There were mixed reactions to the lecture from those who stayed to the end.

"I liked the first half but at the end he sort of perverted Christianity," Bruce Stewuer of Minnesota said. "I guess I would not join it and I would not advise anyone else to join it either. He has interesting thoughts and he's close to what's happening but it's twisted somehow."

"I was a little disappointed with it." Duncan Cooper of New York City said. "He is like a Billy Graham or an Oral Roberts but the language barrier is a problem. However, we do live in a time when a messiah might appear. His ideas are really very secular and political and for a man who talks about lonhe comes on strong. I like my religion a lit gentler."

"I thought it was good," said Gurdun Ullrich, a Unification Church member from Germany.

Rev. Moon, who heads the international religious and political movement that operates a training headquarters in Tarrytown and recently purchased another estate in Irvington, will be speaking on "Christianity in Crisis," and "the new hope," according to full page advertisements in the New York Times.

will go to the church. Though church officials say Carnegie Hall tickets are nearly sold out, some seats are still available and can be purchased at the door.

The church has applied for a tax exemption on the Belvedere estate, but the Tarrytown Village Board tabled a motion to grant one for a second time within a month. The church group is also expected to apply for a tax exemption in Irvington on the farmer Garson Reiner estate, which is reportedly going to be used as Rev. Moon's home. He is married and has seven children.

Several thousand persons paused momentarily during their lunch break yesterday, arrested by the singing of 400 young people positioned at Longfellow Square at Connecticut and M Streets NW. What they heard were humns of the Christian faith, the stress on the Second Coming.

But they were not the usual hymns of the faith. A majority of the wellscrubbed, neatly dressed youths were internationals, singing hymns that are familiar in the Orient or Europe or some other distant them get a little varue when area. "The Old Rugged Cross" and "Amazing Grace" weren't there.

All around the area, other youths were distributing

leaflets with a man's face on them. Buses passed by bearing the same face, a face that will become extremely familiar to people in Washington and 20 other cities in the next four months.

The Rev. Sun Myung Moon of North Korea doesn't exactly make the claim himself, but many of his followers believe that he might be the very essence of the Second Coming of Jesus. If not Jesus come to earth bearing a new name, then at least the precursor of the returning Messiah, another John the Baptist.

Even the most devout of confronted with the question of who Moon is,.

But that is not what really matters, they say. Moon is head of the fast-growing Holy Spirit Association for the Unification of World Christianity, known popularly as the Unification Church.


Devotees - there are an estimated 600,000 of them in the world even though the faith was not established until 1954 — believe that Moon, formerlyy a Presbyterian, is under commission from God to "carry out my undone task." This, among things, means working through family units in tune with God. What Adam and Eve destroyed, he is, through unified families, to restore.

Jesus, the group believes, was frustrated in His attempts to restore the world to God because He was the "second" Adam and was to marry the "second" Eve, or the ideal woman. Together they were to engender the ideal or unified family. The crucifixion came before Jesus could marry and thus thwarted the intention of God through Jesus. Moon, therefore, could be here to fulfill the Adamic role, consummating the ideal marriage.

While there are only about 10,000 devotees in the United States (international headquarters are in Tarrytown, N.Y.), most of these are the fruit of a similar speaking tour through seven U.S.S cities in 1972 and due to the zeal of the youths for spreading his version of the Gospel.

Moon's Washington appearances will be in the form of three lectures open to the public at 8 p.m. Saturday and Sunday and at the same time next Tuesday at George Washington University's Lisner Auditorium.

But quite obviously many of the passerby would hardly forget a lunch hour, that shall we say, was different. Even refreshing. Whoever Moon is.



SUBJECT: ACCOUNTING PROCEDURE

As our movement expands, our financial needs grow, and the need for more accurate records becomes a necessity-both to give us a clear picture of our status and to avoid legal problems. So we have now computerized our financial records here on the national level, which should simplify things on the local level as well, provided certain steps are taken.

We suggest you :

1.12.00

- 1. Familiarize yourself completely with the instructions enclosed herein, especially those people responsible for the finances on a state or center level.
- 2. Make <u>all</u> payments through your U.C. checking account. Pay for small items with cash from the Petty Cash Fund, which is fed from time to time by a check made out to Cash. (See note on page 8 of instruction booklet.)
- 3. Beginning now, be conscientious about recording ALL transactions, and your books will always balance.
- 4. Note that the account numbers have been changed for the last time. Receipts begin with 47 and expenses begin with 50 and 51.
- 5. Familiarize yourself with the new form II Center Reporting to National Headquarters.

### **Registering** as a legal entity

Over the past few months there have been a number of requests from the field pertaining to the legal status of the centers. In response to these requests we have consulted our family lawyer and found that for centers to transact business legally in the name of the Unification Church, each center must register in its state as a foreign non-profit corporation, under the charter of the California corporation, Holy Spirit Association for the Unification of World Christianity, as incorporated in 1961.

In registering as such an entity the director of the center should go to or call the Secretary of State, Division of Corporations and inquire how to register as a foreign non-profit corporation. The local church will be required to fill out a number of forms. Applications for registration must be filled out and this may require the signature of the officers of the corporation. In such a case send the application or forms to National Headquarters for completion.

Being registered as a legal entity is important to the accounting system which has been developed for our Church. For only those centers that operate legally under the name of the Unification Church can be included in the national accounting system now ready for implementation.

### Introduction

The new accounting system that has been developed for our national Church is now ready for implementation. This system when in full operation will enable us to determine with accuracy the financial resourcefulness of our movement.

Before introducing the system it is important to see the significance of accounting in general. As defined, "accounting is the process of identifying, measuring, and communicating financial information to permit informed judgments and decisions by users of the information." Furthermore, through accounting processes an individual, group or organization can control the flow of money in and out of their possession. Such control and information is sought for a variety of reasons. Prospective investors need to know the financial status of an organization before it makes an investment in it. Bankers and suppliers appraise the financial soundness of an organization and weigh the risks involved before making loans or granting credit. Government agencies are concerned with the financial activities of an organization for purposes of taxation and regulation. For some of these same reasons, we are now instituting a national accounting system.


### The System in an Overview

The accounting system we are beginning to implement can best be described as a "home-branch" accounting process. (In our case the home office is National Headquarters and the branches are all the Unification Church Centers in the United States.) It is a system whereby all the U. C. Centers record and summarize all their monetary transactions. Then a copy of the summary will be sent to the National Headquarters at the end of each month. The National Headquarters then consolidates all the data from the centers into one set of financial statements reflecting the financial activities of the total organization. Such an overview enables the National Headquarters to see more clearly the strengths and weaknesses of our financial position, and thus plan accordingly.

The Center Reporting to National Headquarters forms will be used to summarize all the transactions recorded in the journals. At the end of the month this summary will be sent to Headquarters. Journals will be kept by local centers for their own records.

### Clarification of Terms

A specialized journal recording all money paid out by <u>check</u> in a given period.

A specialized journal recording all money in a given period.

Petty Cash Journal

A journal recording all money paid out in currency or coin during a given period.

It is important to note that the source of money for the petty cash is the checking account. Money that is received as income in the form of currency must be deposited in the bank. Then a check is written to <u>Cash</u>; the money from the check then can be placed in the petty cash for use and recording.

Describe the source of the money in this column (i.e., where the money came from, whether an individual donor, an employer, etc.).

This column will not be used in every entry. But, it will be used in those cases where a donor of money requests a receipt of donation or payment on their behalf. (See explanation for Donations.)

No matter what the source of the money, always place the amount received in this column. This is a total amount column.

Record in this column the number of the bank deposit slip. All money, whether currency or checks, are to be recorded and then deposited in the bank. Thus every entry will have a deposit slip number recorded in this column.

Record in this column money received for payment of rent by people living in the center.

Record in this column all money received as a gift (e.g., a student of the Principle comes to a Sunday Service of ours and afterwards donates \$50.00). The money was a gift, rather donation, and not seeking any tangible return. In such a case the donor may ask for a receipt of donation in order that he might deduct it from his income for tax purposes. The receipt you give a person in such circumstances must have a number on it. This then is the number. that would be entered in the column titled Receipt Number.

Financial Projects Record in this column the money received as a result of any fund raising programs. Money from rummage sales, candle sales, peanut sales, book sales (other than Divine Principle books), and any other similar project is to be recorded here.

Note also that an <u>account number</u> is required in this column. Each financial project is to be numbered so as to distinguish one project from another.

For proper numbering of the projects refer to Center Reporting to National Headquarters.

Record in this column money received from miscellaneous sources. Note that an account number is required with each entry.

Record in this column money received from the sale of equipment, the return of a deposit, or the sale of any asset. Also record here any money received as a return on an investment.

Date	Record the date money was spent in this column.
Payee	Describe by name who received your payment.
Check Number	Record the number of your check in this column.
Amount	Record the amount of each check written in this column.
Groceries	Record in this column money spent for groceries.
Supplies	Record in this column money spent on supplies (materiels used in the operating of the center that are of an expendable non-durable quality). Examples of supplies would be stationery, pens and pencils, chalk, chalk board erasers, etc.
Other Household Expenses	Record in this column money spent on goods or services that contribute to the general functioning of the center. Note that this column requires an account number. For proper numbering of accounts refer to the Center Reporting to Nat'l Headquarters forms.
Financial Projects	Record in this column money spent as a result of a financial project. For example the cost of candles that the center sells would be recorded here when the bill was paid.
Other Operating	Record in this column money spent on literature. Also record here travel expenses, i.e., from center to center travel or expense for going to regional conferences. In addition entertainment expenses are to be recorded here.
Petty Cash	Record in this column money drawn from the checking account and placed in the petty cash.
General Ledger	Record in this column money spent on the acquisition of any major asset (equipment) or the payment of any major liability (note payable). Also, record tithing to Nat'l Headquarters in this column. Note this column requires an account number with each entry in the column.


