
"Passing the Values of Faith on to the Future"

Interfaith Conference in Osaka

On 14th October 2024, a conference with the theme "Weaving the Values of Faith into the Future" was held at the Osaka Public Hall in Chūō-ku, Osaka City. This event was organized in light of the government's request a year ago for the dissolution of the

Family Federation for World Peace and Unification (formerly the <u>Unification Church</u>). Over 1,000 people from various religious denominations gathered to reaffirm the importance of the values that faith and religion hold.

In his keynote speech, international lawyer Tatsuki Nakayama (中山達 樹) emphasized that the issue is not that the <u>Family Federation</u> is misunderstood, but rather that it is not understood at all. He pointed out the lack of effort to foster understanding. Quoting the words of Russian literary giant Tolstoy, he urged,

"Before trying to change the world, let's change ourselves."

Humayun Mughal, a Muslim believer and religious commentator, expressed opposition to the government's request for the dissolution order, asserting that

"people are constantly trapped in fixed ideas and preconceived notions, but to break free, we must first make an effort to remove such ingrained ideas from ourselves."

At the conference, representatives from different religions, such as Buddhism and Christianity, sent messages of support, suggesting that "rather than reacting negatively, avoiding each other, or having religions stare each other down just because they belong to different denominations, it is desirable that we recognize and help each other despite our differences, and strive for mutual improvement."

Additionally, a message signed by 108 Christian clergy and university professors from South Korea was presented, urging the Japanese government to respect religious freedom.

Shinichi Watanabe (渡部真一), the chair of the conference's organizing committee, suggested that behind the request for the

dissolution order there might well be "negative feelings and ingrained information about religion." He emphasized the need to "make efforts to convey the preciousness of having faith."

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



Unification Church). The theme for the symposium was "Citizens' Meeting for Niigata Prefecture to Protect Religious Freedom and Human Rights".

In addition to members of the Family Federation, religious leaders from 17 religious organizations participated, including Soka Gakkai and Rissho Kosei-kai. They adopted a declaration promoting the protection of "freedom of religion and democracy in Japan" and firmly protesting "religious discrimination and persecution due to prejudice against any religion".

During the meeting, Family Federation staff member Kenryu Kageyama (影山権龍) (36) delivered a speech on behalf of second-generation believers. In response to the prevailing narrative that second-generation individuals are victims coerced into the faith, Kageyama countered that there are many second-generation believers who are happy to inherit the faith. He emphasized that his life of faith within the Family Federation has served as the underpinnings of his life and been the reason for his personal happiness. Additionally, he conveyed the pain felt by believers who have had their faith – an integral part of their identity – brushed aside due to religious persecution.

Guest speaker Norio Hosoya (細谷典男), a member of the *Toride City Council* in Ibaraki Prefecture, warned that the request for the dissolution order was an "unjust act that violates religious freedom" and would lead to totalitarianism and the secularization of the state.

The declaration will be submitted to the Prime Minister's Office and the Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology.
