## CARP Las Vegas' first-ever Campus Talk at College of Southern Nevada (CSN)

On November 1st, 2017, CARP Las Vegas had its first-ever Campus Talk event at the College of Southern Nevada (CSN). The second speaker was asked a question, "what gets you up everyday?" He reminded us the saying, "it takes a whole village to raise a child," and how he would get up every morning, thinking about all the people who had believed in and invested in him.

Third speaker talked about how peace was all about thinking about giving more than wanting, and how peace spreads by ripple effect of your own action for peace. In response to a question, "how do you let go of hate?", she talked very personally about her own struggle and victory.

Our CARP sponsoring faculty and fourth speaker gave us a new definition of S.O.S. - he explained it as Sacrifice Of Selfishness as a way to create peaceful relationships. He powerfully persuaded the audience with conviction and love to practice selflessness in our daily life.
