It was also the very first fish he had ever landed and seemed to open up the way for the rest of us to do the same. After a little while, everybody had been rewarded for holding a fishing rod. We caught mackerel, whiting, and dogfish, some of which we let go as they were too small to keep.

Fortunately, the mild weather was dry, and the sea was quite calm with only a very slight swell. The sun was also trying to break through the grey clouds. Since almost everybody knew each other, it was not difficult to have a spirit of mutual co-operation among us. Dave the skipper was very supportive, and made hot tea for everyone.

Time passed on quite quickly, and at 17:00 we were back on land. It was a very enjoyable afternoon for all of us, at the end of which we all felt very more connected to each other and the ocean. Furthermore, it was definitely a positive and enjoyable start for Ocean Church providence in North England and it was agreed that these fishing trips should be held on a regular basis, perhaps every three or four months. Hopefully, things can then develop into a substantial invitational event possibly on a national level.
