As the daughter of a national messiah couple, I actively supported my parents with mission work from a young age. I had strong faith, but I also felt isolated. Later, my university life and my job began pulling me away from God. I was no longer sure what I believed in. My life had settled into the routine of teaching high school and spending time with friends, content to live from one day to the next.

Nevertheless, this nagging voice in the back of my head was asking for more. Where was God in my life? Was I not meant to do something greater? Fourteen months ago, my life took an unexpected turn. I lost my job. I was frantically searching for something else, when a chance suggestion from my father led me to apply for a staffing position on the Oceania Leadership Team (OLT). I had no previous experience with this program, but I felt it was the right thing to do. God was calling me to Oceania.

What is OLT all about, you ask? It is about living in a church center with people of diverse nationalities and diverse personalities and managing to unite with all of them under one roof. It is about walking from morning to evening carrying a box of products and swallowing all rejections and personal challenges. It is about

sharing our hearts and volunteering our time to paint schools, build water tanks and give character education to people that have little but are satisfied. Ultimately, it is about experiencing God's heart and making this faith our own.

With my own limited ability and experience, I can do but little; nevertheless, I have faith that God and those in the spirit world are moving in the Oceania region and among OLT members. With the support of the OLT director and our regional president, as well as older church members, we can accomplish many things.

"The unified world begins from Oceania," is something True Father wrote in calligraphy. It hangs in a frame in the Oceania Peace Embassy. I have engraved those words in my heart. I see the potential in this

region, with its youthful spirit and multitude cultures. Our regional president is a second-generation Unificationist who inspires us and works together with us.
