The meeting was moderated by Thomas Schellen, president of UPF Lebanon.

The theme and main focus of the discussion was "The Central Role of Political Leaders in Creating a Foundation for a Better and Prosperous Future in Lebanon." Speakers were asked to address the question, "What are the key points to consider if we are to emerge from this period of crisis?" Each of the political leaders present spoke clearly and forthrightly. Although they presented different perspectives, they all addressed the same concern: to move beyond the current crisis. It was evident that a major challenge will be to find some common ground that will allow them to work together. Yet it is equally clear that their common desire to invest for the sake of the nation is itself a sign of real hope for a better and brighter Lebanon.
