Mrs. Nora Spurgin, at age 77, is the beloved Principal of Bridgeport International Academy (BIA) and was also the esteemed first president of WFWP USA. Under her leadership, WFWP earned the coveted title of an NGO in General Consultative Status with ECOSOC (Economic and Social Council) of the United Nations. During her tenure, the Bridge of Peace ceremonies that are a signature project of WFWP's work in promoting peace, was conceived and realized. Mrs. Spurgin is humble about the role she played for the organization, citing that much of her inspiration and motivation came from the guidance of WFWP's Co-founders Rev. Dr. Sun Myung Moon and Dr. Hak Ja Han Moon.



WFWP USA initially came out of Women's Federation for Peace in Asia, where the Co-founders Rev. and Mrs. Moon initially established the organization in Korea and Japan to promote goodwill between the two countries. When it was decided that WFWP should be established around the world, Rev. Moon asked Mrs. Nora Spurgin to take the responsibility in America. Ms. Spurgin assumed the position... 
23RD NATIONAL ASSEMBLY WFWP USA
