
Generation Peace Academy Weekly Newsletter - October 7, 2024

HUSA - Understanding American History

Hello everyone! This week we continued with our mission in Little Rock, Arkansas.

We had Reverend Clarke from New York give several lectures during our American Christian Providence workshop titled "Ending Racism, the False Ideology in Building Cheon II Guk." Analyzing 400 years of American history and this country's providential role as the "Elder Son" nation, what pushed us forward with the providence, and what held us back.

Kyungwhi Sakuwa, a second year on this program shared his reflection on the lectures. "It opened up my mind to the idea that we can work with other organizations too, which is what, you know, WFWP probably is already doing, but just like on an individual level. What's to say we can't do something like that again– you're working with influential movements that are actually making a big change together!"

There were many more initiatives leading up to the praise and worship service. We prepped lunches with love and gave them to the homeless with an intention of spreading hope. We did a flash mob performance in front of a Walmart and touched the hearts of many with our songs and praises, and reached out to talk about peace.

We also started witnessing and Divine Principle lecturing at the University of Arkansas. For many of our members, it was only their 2nd or 3rd time going one-on-one witnessing, so we were unsure of what to expect. With a prayerful heart, the group split up into trinities, walking around the campus trying to find those who God had prepared. God and spirit world were working very hard that day, we all clearly saw it. Here is a testimony from a first year HUSA sister, Sophia Nix.

"My first time witnessing, I met this guy named Rakesh while on [the]

college campus. He was a 20 year old boxer in training and had an African spiritualist background. While asking him what peace meant to him, he told me 'Peace is harmony.' It's understanding although everybody doesn't sound or look the same, we can all unite and create something beautiful, as if we were doing a symphony. My second time witnessing, I met this young guy named Austin. At the time, my determination was to find the children that God was longing to find and talk to. Austin was a 20 year old guitar player that grew up Christian but lost his faith. I really felt God's heart while talking to him, because it felt like I was able to talk to His long lost son, wanting to form this relationship between parent and child again."

We started practicing lectures based on the series "Peace Starts with Me True Love Seminar" by Dr. Andrew Compton. This new content is to keep up with the changing times of our movement. Practicing with each other, we worked on our public speaking skills as well as expressing the heart of the content.


Joyce Konan, a 3rd year HUSA missionary met Sam, a 21 year-old boxer from Dallas training in Arkansas, who came along with these various initiatives. We were able to bring him to our own Little Rock Family church as well! He also came to our service project to feed the homeless, and started to read the *Mother of Peace*. Sam also started to receive the Peace Start with Me education from Rev. Compton.

We hosted a board game night at True Brew cafe, which is connected to the Little Rock Family Church. Snacks, lattes, and mocktails were set up for guests and friends. Throughout the night of board games, Just Dance, Super Smash Bros, and improv, we were able to cultivate and experience a culture of heart to connect with those who came.

We attended two bible studies, one at the Faith Temple Full Gospel Deliverance Center and one at New Life Church, to get to know these congregations and to understand their heart towards God and Jesus Christ.

"I really enjoyed this bible study session 'cause it connected a lot to how God was speaking to me today. Lately my faith has been very shaky and I've been more of a fan of God rather than an obedient follower. I love the things he does for others, but I myself didn't desire grace from him because I felt I had to earn it. My central figure pointed this out to me today, to which I was very grateful. To live a life devoted to God means you cannot continuously go back to your old self. It made me think back to Jesus' quote in the Bible. "So, because you are lukewarm, and neither hot nor cold, I will spit you out of my mouth" –Revelation 3:16. I also noticed that I was displaying an act of self righteousness throughout these weeks, when instead I should've been more humble and seeking God's guidance. This bible study helped me hear God's voice and direction clearly. Now I understand what I must do now going forward in my life of faith" –Nasaan Benson.

We learned a lot about center life from Christine Froehlich, understanding the significance of how the culture we create influences our life of faith. And based on the culture, we can either have a positive or negative impact on one another. As young missionaries we need to learn how to work in harmony with one another, which starts by have compassion and seeing each other from God's perspective.



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
