Delaware Church Celebrates New Building Location for Worship

The inaugural service of the Grand View Farms Family Church was held on a beautiful spring day, Sunday, April 14, 2013 in Middletown, Delaware. Known as the first state in the nation to ratify the Constitution of the United States (December 7, 1787)—hence the nickname "The First State"— Delaware is a state of self-determined, self-motivated Unificationists. Delaware is also famous for the dramatic midnight ride of Caesar Rodney who rode 70 miles through a thunderstorm on July 1, 1776 to arrive at Independence Hall in time to cast Delaware's decisive vote for independence.

District Pastors Pablo and Dr. Ann Iparraguirre presented a strategic plan for support and development of local churches, proactively moving toward True Mother' church-growth goals, and integration of a Divine Principle Unificationist way of life. Thanks to the new karaoke tracks from Event Producer David Eaton and others at HQ, we enjoyed beautiful, inspiring music and singing!

In the climate of support for Family Church development at the local level, Anne-Marie Mylar (also the Webmaster of the Online Matching Service for adult Unificationists) was inspired to transform the basement of the Mylar's beautiful home in the Grand View Farms community into a gathering place for the local Family Church. Mylar shared about her inspiration and experience bringing it to life:

"Shortly after retuning to the mainland from Hawaii, my husband, Kem, ascended to the spiritual world. Because of my husband's passing, I found myself with a large house. Kem and I had often talked about sharing our house with church members, and I saw this time as an opportunity for our community that did not have a place to gather.

The community welcomed this idea and it seemed like just the right time to do it! Pastor Shota Iwasaki and his children came a couple of times to help in the transformation of the basement. Lyle and Nancy Barton helped with this project, and Lyle came every week to help with cleaning and construction. 2,500 pounds of paper were shredded as they cleaned out the basement in preparation for its new mission. "We repainted it, bought new chairs, and I am using my daughter's childhood toys for the children who come to the service," said Mylar.

"I am continually impressed by Aunt Anne-Marie," commented second-generation Unificationist Alexia Miller, who added: "After moving to a new state and finding herself with time and a big house on her

hands, she didn't just sit back and relax -- instead, she made big changes, opening her home to our community, sharing the joy and beauty of Grand View Farms Family Church. Aunt Anne-Marie is not one to sit back and let the Providence take place all by itself!"

Their home has a large meeting room and a smaller adjacent room for sharing meals and children's activities. That room opens into a large, fenced back yard. The rooms are bright and airy, allowing sunlight to flood into the hearts of participants and into all the activities. It is a perfect place for Sunday Service, educational programs, as well as community- and social gatherings. It has a relaxing atmosphere, and the added benefit of a tree-lined field and garden.
