"The alarming dissolution case based on retroactive justice was driven by politics, not law," claims Family Federation president in interview with large monthly magazine

## Calling for an Apology from Former Prime Minister Kishida

On 25th March 2025, the Tokyo District Court issued a ruling ordering the dissolution of the Family Federation for World Peace and Unification (formerly the Unification Church) under the Religious Corporations Act. I asked Tomihiro Tanaka, President of the organization, for his thoughts on the court's ruling, the current state of the organization, and his views on the public distrust surrounding it.

- What are your thoughts on the court's ruling, President Tanaka?

**Tanaka:** I was truly shocked by the <u>dissolution order</u>. I must say that none of our claims were considered at all. Prior to the <u>district court's ruling</u>, we were fined for not responding to government inquiries, and we lost the "administrative fine" (non-penal fine) case even <u>at the Supreme Court</u>. However, that case was about fines, whereas this one is about dissolving our legal entity, which I see as an entirely different matter.

When I read the <u>decision</u> document, I was appalled. Rather than pointing out what exactly was wrong with our <u>organization</u> to justify its dissolution, the <u>decision</u> was based on an assumption: that since the <u>organization</u> hasn't changed, it will likely commit the same wrongdoings again. This was the basis for the <u>ruling</u>.

To impose a "death sentence" on our legal status based on such reasoning suggests a fervent desire to "destroy the <u>organization</u>". This is nothing short of a "politically motivated trial." I also believe that the <u>verdict</u> was <u>influenced by the Supreme</u> <u>Court's hostile stance</u> shown during the "administrative fine" (non-penal fine) case.

There was no consideration of non-retroactivity either. In other words, and I will elaborate on this later, they are applying rules retroactively to past events and using those new rules to judge us. It feels as though people who had already finished their judicial proceedings and returned to normal life were suddenly told, "Your previous judgment was too lenient," and given the death penalty all over again.

### An organization pointed out as "socially problematic"

# - The dissolution procedure was initiated by then-Prime Minister Fumio Kishida.

Tanaka: The problem with Kishida started on 31st August 2022, when he announced the "severing of ties" with <u>our organization</u>. On that day, he held a press conference at the Prime Minister's Office, speaking as the president of the Liberal Democratic Party (LDP), urging its members to avoid associations with "organizations that are pointed out as problematic by society."

There's a difference between "organizations pointed out as problematic by society" and "organizations that are actually problematic." Despite calling for severing ties, Kishida never explained what exactly was problematic about us or why we could be labeled a socially problematic organization; he didn't say a single word about it in his statement.

He essentially said,

"Because someone is saying it's a problem, cut ties with them."

Then, on 14th October 2022, the Cabinet approved a written government response stating clearly that, since there had been no criminal penalties imposed on our executives, <u>our organization</u> did not meet the requirements for dissolution under the Religious Corporations Act. Therefore, no dissolution order had been requested. Based on the existing legal interpretation, it was obvious that dissolving us was not possible - and the government officially acknowledged that fact.

However, after that, legal interpretations began to veer off course and were distorted. On 17th October Kishida suddenly announced his intent to exercise the "right to ask questions" - a measure only used when there is already a reason to consider dissolution. Since the Cabinet had just acknowledged on 14th October that there was no basis for dissolution, exercising the right to question made no sense. Kishida's statement clearly contradicted the Cabinet's decision.

Most likely, Kishida did not understand the law and made a hasty statement. It also seemed he didn't fully grasp that the right to question is not for fishing around to uncover crimes. This became evident in his later remarks. The right to question is to be used only when there is already a confirmed illegal act that could justify dissolution - and only to further investigate those facts. You can't assert there's no reason for dissolution on one hand and then exercise the questioning right on the other.

A ceremony was held on 27<sup>th</sup> May in Seoul to commemorate the 71<sup>st</sup> anniversary of the *Family Federation for World Peace and Unification*. Many media outlets reported about the event, held in the *Cheonseung Church* in Cheonwon Temple in Yongsan, a central district of the South Korean capital. 700 pastors from across the country took part together with especially invited guests.

"To commemorate the 71st anniversary, a variety of awards were

presented in different categories: long service awards (including 33-year and 15-year service), recognition of churches with outstanding evangelism and blessing performance, awards for exemplary families, and a booklet competition. A 'new start resolution ceremony' was also held, symbolizing support and succession across generations between elder and youth pastors."

The Namdo Ilbo pointed out,

"As Korea recorded its lowest ever total fertility rate of 0.75 last year – now considered a national crisis – the international mass **Blessing** ceremonies, which emphasize **family values**, are being reevaluated as a possible solution to declining birthrates and challenge such as anti-marriage trends and the DINK (dual income, no kids) lifestyle."

The Joongdo Ilbo commented,

"The Family Federation is also regarded as the origin of K-Religion [See editor's note below], having started in Korea and expanded worldwide. Believers from all over the world continue to visit Korea – considered the homeland of their faith – on pilgrimages, with visitors this year coming from Europe, the Americas, Asia, and Africa. A growing number of foreign believers are also settling in Korea."

The Namdo Ilbo also mentioned the congratulatory remarks by Pastor Gil-chun Choi of Changsine Church (Presbyterian Church of Korea). According to the paper, he said,

"I thank the Family Federation for its devoted efforts in the religious peace movement over the past 71 years. The Korea Christian Clergy Association also shares the same heart and will move together toward our common goal of realizing God's Kingdom, beyond the vision of a unified Korea."

The Segye Ilbo quoted Guk Hwangbo, the president of the Korean branch of the Family Federation. In his commemorative speech, he said,

> "This is a meaningful occasion when we for the first time since the great victorious foundation of the **entrance ceremony** for the Cheonil Sanctum in the Cheonwon Temple was laid, can dedicate the **founding** of the foderation to Heaven amid

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the opening of an era with a sphere here on earth of living in the Kingdom of Heaven." He also added, "Today will be a historical turning point that reveals the status and power of the Family Federation for World Peace and Unification to the world, and it will be a providential moment that testifies that our Heavenly Parent is alive and working."

According to the media reports, the commemorative program also included congratulatory messages from Sun-jo Hwang, Policy Chair of the *Central Administration of Cheonmu-won* (the new international headquarters), and Kyung-deuk Yoo, Chair of the Family Federation Foundation.



There were also encouraging remarks by Yeon-ah Moon, Chairperson of the Sunhak Institute, representing Holy Mother Han, and a special performance by youth pastors and congratulatory songs.

What was then called the *Holy Spirit* Association for the Unification of World Christianity was founded on 1<sup>st</sup> May 1954. The name became the Family Federation in 1996. The founding date 1<sup>st</sup> May was according to our solar calendar, but recent anniversaries have been commemorated on the first day of the

fifth month according to the oriental lunar calendar. It is common in South Korea to celebrate birthdays and anniversaries following this calendar.
