At Christmas time this past year my eldest son and his girlfriend of many years came to visit and two days later announced their engagement. The first time we met Ashley, she and our son had said they would never marry, that it was not a part of their lifestyle. How things change!

All is not necessarily "perfect," but our Heavenly Parent is alive and moving in our midst, transforming our hearts with boundless love. This year in the Beebe family is proof of this.



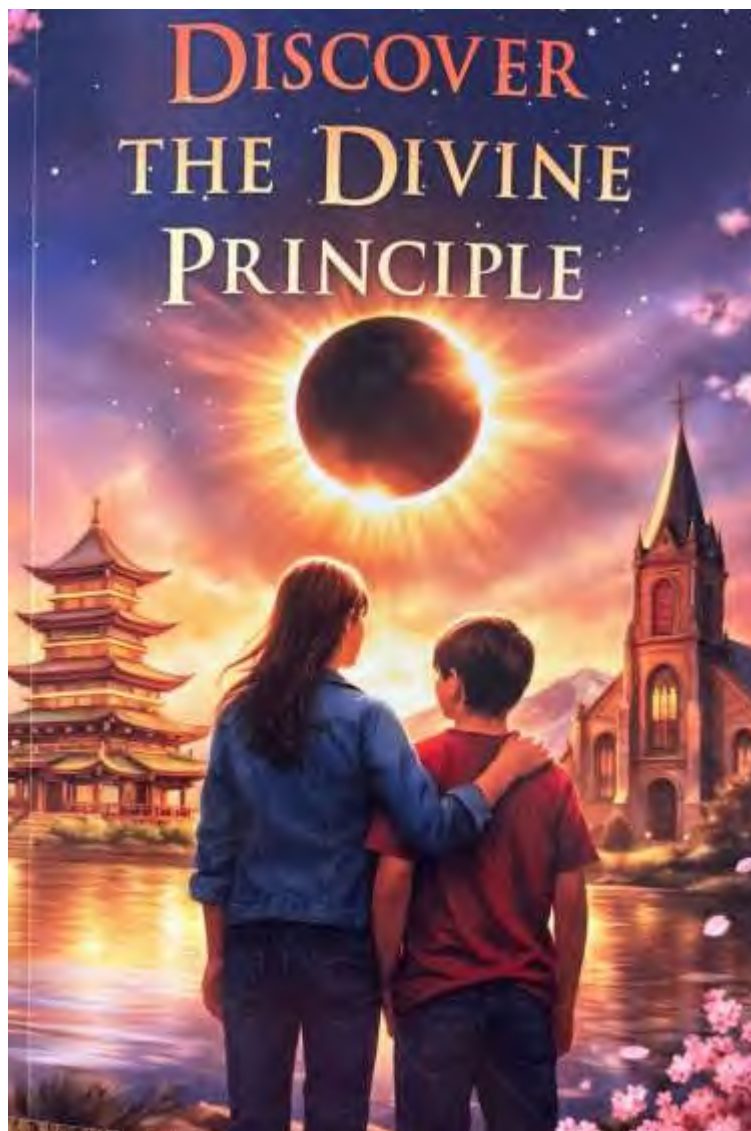




Unification Thoughts

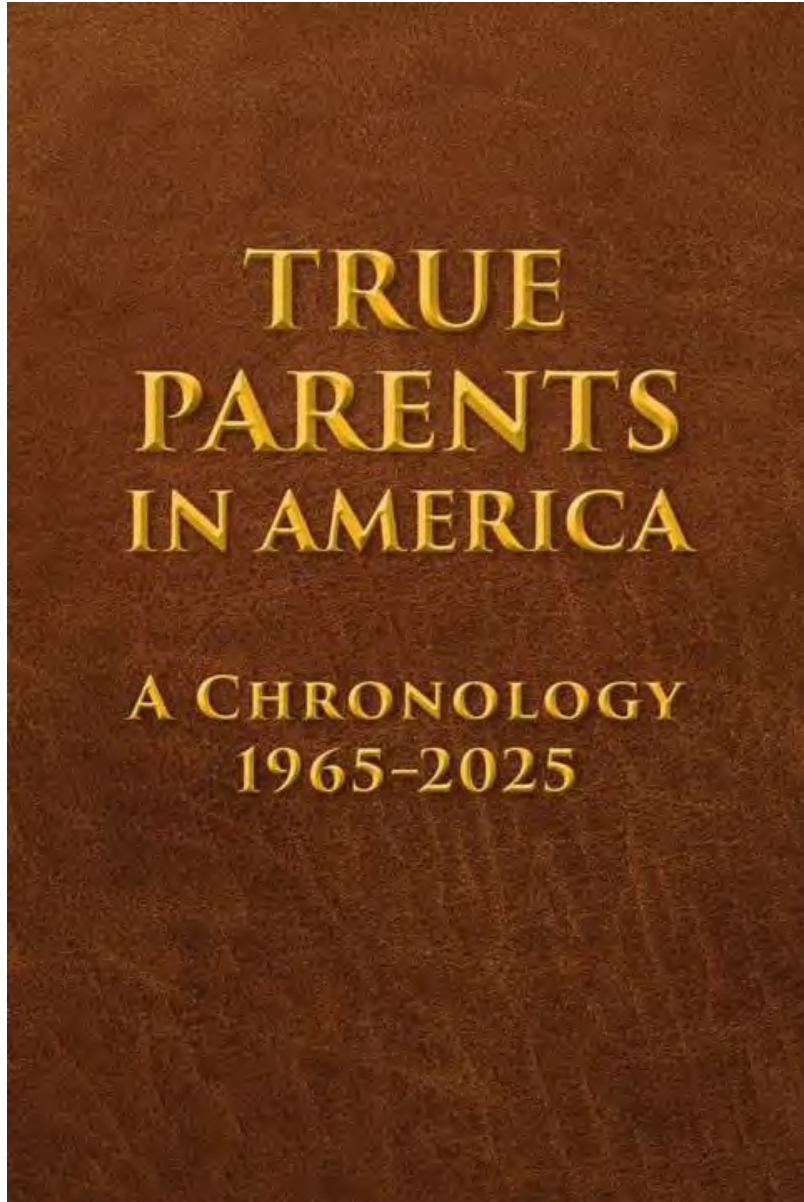

Book Review

True Parents In America



True Parents in America: A Chronology, 1965-2025 is a joint project of the *Sunhak* Institute of History USA, the *Hyo Jeong* East Garden Museum, and the Family Federation for World Peace and Unification. The chronology documents True Parents' day-to-day activities in the United States over a span of 60 years from True Father's first visit in February 1965 through True Mother's visit to New York and Las Vegas in January 2025.

The scope of True Parents' work in America is immense but includes three major emphases. First and foremost, True Parents proclaimed God's Word. The chronology includes every recorded sermon, every speech delivered by True Parents during public speaking tours, all recorded commentaries delivered as part of daily *Hoon Dok Hae* gatherings for reading and study, all proclamations and all conference addresses. Second, True Parents exercised spiritual and pastoral leadership. The chronology documents the establishment of holy grounds, holy

marriage blessings officiated by True Parents, holy day celebrations, Director and Leader Meetings, workshops and training sessions in which True Parents participated, visits to centers in the field, prayer conditions, fishing conditions and tournaments, declarations of milestones in the providence and their initiation of new movement traditions. Third, True Parents pursued initiatives consistent with their vision of social and cultural transformation. The chronology documents their work with scientists, religious leaders, civic officials, academics, artists, journalists and others, their establishment of organizations and federations dedicated to world peace, and their development of economic enterprises dedicated to technological equalization and alleviation of world hunger. In addition, True Parents endured public opposition and prosecution, even persecution, as recorded in this chronology.

Sources used for this chronology include Unification Church/Family Federation periodicals, books, websites, speech collections, online and print chronologies, travel and visitor records, personal journals, eyewitness accounts, and non-Unification materials, i.e., books, investigative reports and newspaper accounts. Specific citations for each entry in the chronology will be listed in an online source document.

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Discover the Divine Principle

1. What inspired you to write a Discover Divine Principle –and who is the intended audience?

I saw a need with my own grandchildren and wanted to address it. Isn't that the way a lot of things happen? While reading a Children's Bible with them, misconceptions would arise—a limited understanding of the stories portrayed—but I had no real way to address them. I'm sure we've all felt that at times—the gap between Divine Principle thought and fundamental Christian theology.

My oldest grandson loves to read aloud and, after finishing the Bible, we began reading *A Little History of the World* by Ernst Gombrich.

I had sometimes read excerpts in my high school history classes. Gombrich, an art historian, wrote the

history classes. Commonly, an art historian, wrote the book for young readers—and later his granddaughter helped him to translate it into English. The writing style is easygoing and conversational while—at the same time—it distills intense subject matter from wars to empires.

And so, I thought, *that's what we need and maybe Nathanael can help me*. I had no idea what I was getting in for! Adapting the Divine Principle for young readers was like trying to fit an elephant into a shoe box. It was important to me not to just “water down” the teaching. So, the age range kind of expanded to include ages 12 to 90.

2. How did your grandson help you?

He was age 12 when he read aloud the Introduction and God's Dream to me. He would stumble slightly on a word like finite and but some vocabulary challenge is good and can easily be corrected. His response was, “That was really interesting, Grammy.” And thus a partnership was born. I asked his parents before we tackled the Fall of Man because—as you know—it can be, not graphic, but, nevertheless, a little explicit especially as compared to the Genesis story.

3. What does he say about the experience?

He has said to me, “I understand, so I know other young people will.” Honestly, I didn't pay him to say that!

I think he's a bit unusual in that he's a voracious reader who loves to read aloud. When he was younger, he would sit in a room by himself and read aloud. Reading aloud does take extra effort, but it helped me so much with sentence fluidity, adjusting the writing level and so forth. At times he would correct me, “You need a comma there,” or he'd question an idiom (I'm famous for mixing metaphors). We jumped ahead a little and read all three Jesus-related chapters over Easter and I hope we read the Biblical figures this summer. I don't see him every week. He lives in Montreal and I live in Vermont but, more than that, he and his siblings are getting busier with school, social life, and sports. It's a three-ring circus for their parents.

4. What do you hope others will gain from the reading—or in some cases—the re-reading of the Divine Principle?

I hope they find the Divine Principle still relevant today. We have vast and wonderful teachings but I'm hoping this can be something simple enough to give to a friend, yet complex enough for a long-time member to read and say, “I still believe that...maybe a little differently...” The core truths are still present and can inspire one for a lifetime. That's my thought.

If I've conveyed the heart of God to some degree, I've succeeded, but that remains to be seen.

5. What did you personally gain from the experience?

I gained a real appreciation of Old Testament history! Not only are the stories fascinating and epic, in and of themselves, but their wisdom carries

in and of themselves, but their wisdom carries forward to us today. I identified with Moses, not being able to enter the Promised Land, and I felt Jesus's pitiful circumstances on a visceral level. Maybe running on caffeine and less sleep opened me to the spiritual experience of the whole project—I wasn't just writing it; I was immersed in it.

6. Writing is a solitary process—until it isn't. What supports did you lean into? What sources did you use? And what skills and experience prepared you the most to undertake this writing project?

Being a high school teacher helped and hurt. Turning off that internal critic is hard! I had to ignore the voice in my head that said I couldn't do it or shouldn't do it, and just plow ahead for my grandson. One skill that really helped was writing for the New World Encyclopedia Project. As a writer, you had to take a lot of material and boil it down to its essence within a deadline.

My other sources are listed in the back of the book under "Further Reading." One thing I didn't list was my 1972 study guide that smells musty. I had all the various readings, including that study guide, laid out on the living room floor. I also used large graph paper to draw the parallels which were dizzying and almost too repetitive.

To me, it's like taking paint and drawing a picture. That's the creative part, but seasoned teachers like Gerry Servito and Joy Pople kept me on track with Unification Thought links and biblical references. It was important to me to stay close to the bones and not have this be my interpretation.

7. Do you have any advice for writers?

Cut mercilessly, I had at least 5,000 words that I cut and stored in a Word file. It's easy to expand our writing but the craft comes in whittling it down – at least for me, since I'm an overwriter.

Also, consider using Grammarly, but carefully. You have to check every grammar tweak, every grammar suggestion it makes. It's like auto-correct on steroids.

And write lots of revisions. High school students used to hand me their papers and declare, "I'm done."

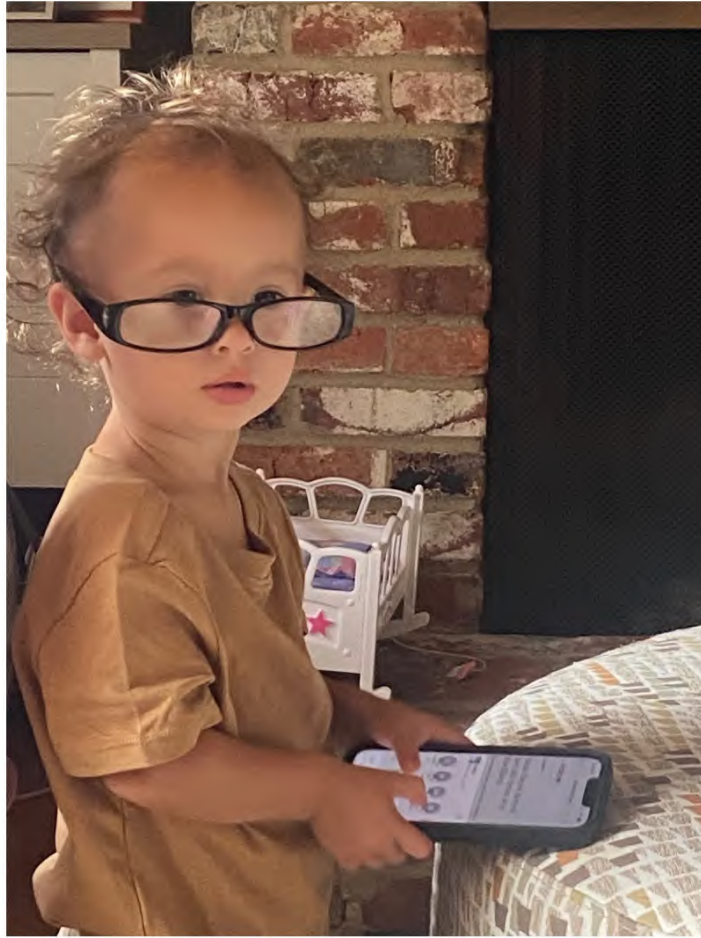
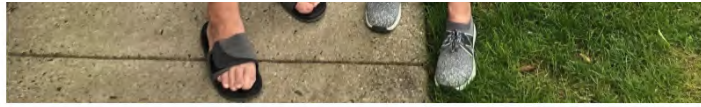
Reluctantly, I had to hand them back saying, "No you're not!"

I said those exact three words to my husband at least six times over the course of writing Discover the Divine Principle.

My role was to care for and serve the Moon's during their stay. From this time, I have two unforgettable memories. One afternoon, as I was coming into the Center, I saw this young lady with long hair speaking excitedly on the phone. I wondered who it was until she turned her head and I was surprised to see it was Mother Moon. (Until then, we had only seen her long hair pulled back in an elegant large bun.) She was using the downstairs phone to receive a call from her children in Korea while Father was on the phone in their room upstairs. It was a special moment for me, seeing the reality of the sacrifice their family was making.

The other vivid memory I have is of Father Moon. One afternoon the ladies in the kitchen had prepared some drinks and snacks for him. I took the tray up the stairs and knocked quietly on the door. I didn't hear any answer and wondered what I should do. I had been told that he needed the drinks, so I slowly and quietly opened the door and there sat Father Moon on the floor with his head down. He looked up at me with tear-filled eyes. I felt so badly I had

interrupted him. I quickly apologized, sat the tray next to him and left as quietly as I could. He was preparing for his speech that evening. I was so embarrassed to have invaded his prayer time.

Reverend Moon teaches that the suffering of humanity has caused deep grief in the heart of God. Seeing him sitting on the floor made me realize how sensitive he was to God's suffering heart and also the suffering of humanity. How serious he was to share that with our country and the world!

Blazing the Trails of the Third Blessing

Based on a recent conversation with Jennifer and Paul—two newer friends and active seniors—this article highlights a meaningful volunteer path they've embraced together: caring for local trails and forests.

The Japanese concept of *Shinrin-yoku*, or “forest bathing,” has gained attention in recent years. Books on mindful meditation, nature connection, and the relationship between trees, health, and happiness all point to a simple truth: time spent immersed in nature can be deeply restorative.

For Jennifer, that connection runs deep. “My friendship with the mountains and forests began before I was born,” she shared. “My parents met at the base of Mt. Washington in New Hampshire. They carried me up mountains in a backpack when I was a baby.” Her lifelong love of the outdoors naturally led her toward conservation work.

Jennifer and Paul first met through a small neighborhood group that began as a book club during the summer of 2020. Formed in the midst of the pandemic, the group brought together people living nearby, and the friendships that grew from it have proven both supportive and enduring.

So when Jennifer became involved with the New York–New Jersey Trail Conference, an organization dedicated to protecting and maintaining public lands, Paul, curious and eager, joined her on a volunteer outing—and quickly became involved himself.

Reflecting on his experience, Paul described trail

volunteering in deeply personal terms:

“Volunteering on the trails, you are enveloped with a sense of the third blessing. You are engaged in the actual work of the third blessing. Everything in this environment is real. There’s nothing fake—no advertising, no artificial colors, no artificial anything. It’s the most real experience you can have. And every time I come away feeling more complete.”

Volunteers begin by attending a workshop where they learn to identify native and invasive plants, as well as common tree diseases. They can indicate how far they’re willing to travel and the level of physical activity they prefer. From there, they are assigned to a location and a role.

The work varies widely. Some volunteers walk trails, observe conditions, and record data. Others take on more hands-on tasks such as removing invasive species, restoring paths by repositioning stones, or even helping to build new trails.

Each year brings a specific environmental focus. Recently, efforts have centered on Beech Tree Disease, which has spread widely across the region. Volunteers help identify potentially resistant trees, providing valuable data that scientists use for further analysis, including DNA research. Future projects may even include partnerships with trained K-9 units that can detect invasive species.

Jennifer and Paul have contributed their time at several local sites, including Apshawa Preserve in West Milford, Hilltop Reservation in Verona, and areas in Cedar Grove. A typical volunteer session may involve up to three hours of work, along with travel and hiking time to reach the designated area.

The work isn’t without its challenges. “Volunteering during the heat wave last year was probably the toughest,” they noted. Still, the rewards clearly outweigh the difficulties.

Together, they share a simple invitation: more people should get involved. “There are so many wonderful individuals doing this work,” they said. “You don’t need to be a professional. Just find a trail you love and offer your time. Go for it.”







At the end of the season, volunteers gather for an informal celebration—complete with team trivia games, small prizes, and pizza. Last year’s event brought together about 50 participants, offering a chance to relax, connect, and reflect on the impact of their efforts.

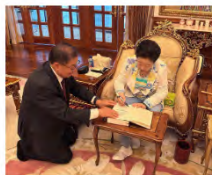
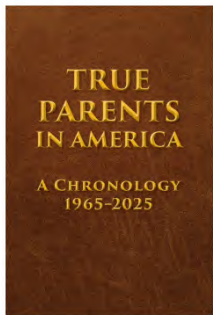
