Luncheon Meeting with Las Vegas UPF, CARP and a Nevada Assemblyman

They spoke of their plan to develop an 'Advisory Board' of civic leaders and educators for the purpose of developing forums and eventually a large rally to support the values advocated by CARP of God-Centered Traditional Marriage and civic responsibility.
