Vanuatu women receive reading glasses

For several years, the NSW Chapter of WFP has sent schoolbooks and sewing machines to our sisters in Vanuatu. Many of these schoolbooks have been distributed to schools on distant islands where the need for these is great.

Members of WFP Vanuatu were invited by local women to visit some of these islands like Malakula and Tanna. While there, the members realised that many homes on these islands do not have electricity which impedes children and adults from studying or working at night while residents in homes that use firelight as a source of light have experienced deteriorating eyesight.

To respond to these difficulties, WFP Victoria contributed to a project which supplied solar lights to Tanna Island while WFP NSW donated reading glasses to help those whose eyesight has deteriorated.

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Reflections from the Sewing Trainee


Nelly Masuaku - WFP Solomon Islands

Attending the Sewing Training program was not only a great privilege but a wonderful opportunity to learn many new skills. The program which ran for five days from 7th May to 11th May 2018 focused on training trainers in the development of skills in using industrial sewing machines. The program also provided the trainers with skills in how to instruct other women interested in using these sewing machines.

Although short, the program provided me with a range of skills in using industrial sewing machines from threading the machine to using different types of decorative stitches and overlocking techniques. As well, I feel more confident in being able to share my skills with the young girls and women who are interested in developing their sewing skills.

One of the major aims of conducting this training program was to build the skills of women involved in sewing the school uniforms of students at the New Hope Academy School. Eventually, it is hoped that these women will be able to participate actively in the proposed WFP sewing outlet whose aim it is to encourage women to become more financially independent. Through this outlet, women will be able to design and sew a range of outfits using island inspired patterns which will be used as a stream to earn an income.

I appreciate the efforts of the WFP SI team who organized this training program and I look forward to sharing my skills with other girls and women in our organisation who are interested in developing their sewing skills.

Melbourne, Australia, 16th of June 2018


On the 16th of June a Peace-building Leadership Seminar was held, with a focus on Egypt in history with respect to peace building.

At the end of the seminar, Dr Coles proposed that Egypt could play a significant role in resolving the Israeli Palestinian conflict and presented this proposal to Mr Mohamed Fakhry. The proposal involves the international community funding and building a new Capital City for Palestine. To do this Egypt and Israel would work together and give up a tiny amount of territory within a twenty kilometre radius of point C, outlined on the map below.

The keynote presenter was Dr John Coles. Dr Coles is the author of the book published by CFT Press: Macroscopic Historical Correlation – Jacob is Revealed and God Affirmed (2016).



Dr John Coles is an Australian Physicist who obtained his PhD at the University of Cambridge, UK. He was a Research Fellow at the Australian National University, Canberra, and other universities. His research on human history spanned

David Westbrook, CEO and Founder of Westy-media Group and Building a Better Australia Group, received the Ambassador for Peace award at the end of the seminar. Building a Better Australia Group was set up to provide free of charge training for young people wanting work experience in the film production. At a time when news reports expound the tensions between races, ethnicities and religions, it is heart-warming to know that a group of women in the Yarra Valley are working towards breaking down racial and religious stereotypes to create community cohesion.

Women's Federation for World Peace ran the 2nd Faith Stories event on 7th July 2018 with a focus on Eastern faiths & philosophies.

The panel of speakers were well known representatives from their faith communities.

Five women from very different ethnic groups, faith backgrounds, and life histories with one common thread expressed best by John, an attendee, who said "Faith Stories made me realise that we are so close to each other. Our spiritual journeys are so similar; we are 'one family' and share such a common experience as human beings in our personal growth, our relationship

within our families and how we relate to each other within our community. Everyone should hear these stories!"



Attended by over 40 people, the feedback was overwhelmingly positive. "Insightful", "informative", "builds community", "speakers were excellent", "stories all resonated with everyone", "a wonderful day" were just some of the lovely words shared with us.

Local media provided support for the event via 3 interviews with WFWP Victoria President Anne Bellavance. “It was encouraging that local Community Radio embraced the concept of Faith Stories, it made me feel connected to my Hills community,” said Anne Bellavance.



As a visual anchor to reinforce the intent for this event which is to connect communities, the word COMMUNITY was designed using faith emblems - Islam, Buddhism, Shintoism, M to represent the Many other faiths that are included as part of our community, Sikhism, Dreamtime Aboriginal (symbol for Person), Wicca/paganism (but also symbol for other faiths: Baha’i, Latter Day Saints), Christianity, and Judaism. These emblems represent that all faiths working together make up a community.



Based on the success of this event, WFWP are looking forward to further promoting community cohesion through another Faith Stories event next year. We would welcome any ideas / suggestions for our theme.

R for Resonance:


An exercise on how to develop a realm of resonance



WFWP Queensland in conjunction with UPF Queensland organised an evening seminar on July 4th 2018 at the Interfaith Community Centre in Annerley. The seminar was attended by a total of 75 people amongst whom were several community leaders. Susi Evans, President of WFWP Queensland and the Reverend Steve Evans, Director of UPF Queensland coordinated the event together.

Amongst the special guests were Dr. Robert Kittel, World President of Youth and Students for Peace (YSP), Rev. Shang Park (FFWPU Continental Director for the Oceania Region), Mr. Greg Stone (UPF Secretary General for the Oceania Region) and Rev. Soon Teck Lim (FFWPU Australia President). After Aunty Peggy Tidyman, an Indigenous elder and Ambassador for Peace (AFP) delivered the 'Acknowledgement of Country, the seminar commenced.

The assembly highlighted the need for a body of NGO leaders, whose collective wisdom and judgment can complement the deliberations of the United Nations; which as a body of government representatives is overwhelmingly male. Support our Service Projects in the Pacific Islands

Why the Pacific Islands?

WFWP Australia focuses its Service Projects in the Island Nations of the Oceania region (Vanuatu, Solomon Islands, Fiji, and Samoa). These regions are some of the poorest countries in the world. The 2014 World Bank ranking of 181 nations according to GDP for the Pacific Islands is: Solomon Island (ranked 131), Micronesia (123), PNG (127), Vanuatu (119) Marshall Islands (113), Samoa (103), and Fiji (95). In these countries, there is no social security, and no free education, even in public schools. For these reasons, and especially being these regions our immediate neighbours, we feel responsible for their wellbeing and development.

Some of our Service Projects in the Island Nations of Oceania

Women's Sewing Centres



Dating back to 2003, WFWP Women's Sewing Centres provide Island women an opportunity to gain skills and support their families economically. They have been established in Vanuatu, Solomon Islands, Fiji and Samoa.

New Hope Academy



In 2010, WFWP Australia provided funding for the building of the New Hope Academy. The school was established as a kindergarten and opened with an intake of 40 students ranging from 3 to 6 years old. It now accommodates more than 100 children and is a growing primary school.

In 2018 WFWP Victoria donated a set of 32 iPads, which function as additional learning resources for the teachers and students. This donation has boosted the learning curve for students to the next level, making the school grow in popularity. Now the New Hope Academy is the first kindergarten in Solomon Islands that has a computer class where students can access new technology, learn new things and develop their skills as part of their learning experience.

Pacific Islands Scholarship Fund



The WFWP "Pacific Islands Scholarship Fund", is a not for profit development program launched in March 2017 that aims to provide young adults from Solomon Islands and Vanuatu with opportunities to access empowering education programs in their own country. The program supports young people who are passionate about getting an education and who align their heart with one of the values and goals of WFWP: "Living for the sake of others".

Our first chosen recipients are Jenny (currently in her second year of studies to become a primary school teacher) and Janet (currently in her first year of studies in early childhood education). As a newly graduated teachers, Jenny and Janet will be employed in the New Hope Academy.

Report on WFWP SI Sewing Department Program Training of Trainers

Honiara, February 27th 2018

The WFWP Solomon Islands are privileged to have two wonderful women who are dedicating themselves to keep our sewing department operating effectively. These two women are Nelly Masuaku and Catharine Rongona.

With the help of these women, the following achievements have been made possible -

- During July, 50 sets of uniforms for students were produced in response to a request from New Hope Academy.
- During August and September, sets of uniforms for 2019 will be produced. Altogether, it is planned to produce 100 shirts, 100 pairs of trousers and 100 dresses.
- To increase sales, new products have been designed and manufactured. The new products are different sized clothing hanger bags. So far, 7 large bags, 4 medium bags and 2 small bags have been produced. While the larger bags will be sold for SBD 50, the medium size bags will be retailed at SBD 30 and the small bags for SBD 25.

The women intend to increase the types of products they design and create in the future. These products include handbags, shirts, peg holders, pillow cases and floor mats although the prior-

ity will be to produce school uniforms for 2019. To facilitate the sales of these products, it is intended we build an extension next to the current school retail shop.

Reflection from the Tailors:

1) Nelly Masuaku

I really enjoy creating, cutting and sewing products. I feel really good when I am doing these activities. To make our sewing more effective, it would be lovely to get a machine that can do button holes. It is our vision to train more women to sew products and so we can make more products and sell these in our shop. It would be good to open up our own WFWP shop.



1) Catharine Rongona

I really enjoy sewing and it is my aim to improve my sewing to a high standard. It would be nice to be able to create new designs and dressmaking patterns. I would appreciate attending a workshop on pattern designing so that I can broaden my knowledge and skills and sew better quality products. I am really enjoying my time sewing for WFWP SI and for the New Hope Academy.

Changing lives through education

Janet's experience at SINU

Honiara, August 24th 2018



A new scholarship candidate sponsored by the WFWP 'Pacific Island Scholarship Fund' has been successful in enrolling in the Early Childhood Education Course at the Solomon Islands National University. Janet, who is our candidate enrolled at the University in March 2018 and is currently completing her first semester. With a passion for helping children to receive an excellent education, Janet hopes to achieve success in her course and is looking forward to becoming a professional early childhood teacher.

When interviewed, Janet explained that her favourite school subject was Social Science. She explained further, "I really enjoyed it because I learnt more about the wellbeing of human beings which has helped me to develop and has contributed to my current studies."

Janet is happily married and mother to two children. She, herself, comes from quite a large family, having ten siblings (four brothers and six sisters). Her parents, she explained worked hard to send each one of her siblings to school.

"In the Solomon Islands," she revealed, "Many young people find it difficult to complete their education due to financial restrictions. School fees are very expensive, especially if the family lives in rural areas, which was my situation. In fact, many students in the Solomon Islands

come from rural areas, which make it hard for their family or themselves to afford school fees." In most cases, parents can only afford to send the older children to school, resulting in limited opportunities for younger children in a family. Furthermore, when finances are no longer available, many young adults end up dropping out of school or college and not completing their education. As a result, they have limited access to well paid jobs as they lack qualifications.

In Janet's family, only a few of her siblings managed to complete high school. Luckily, three of them were able to attend university - one brother graduated with a Bachelor of Theology and is now working as a senior priest in the local Anglican Church; one sister graduated with a Diploma in Nursing; and another one of her brothers is studying to be a mechanic.

We asked Janet what her aspirations are for the future: "I want to support my siblings and those who go through the same struggles as we did growing up. I want to improve our standard of living and build a better life for my family. Through these studies at SINU, I want to become someone who people will respect and look up to for guidance. I want to become a good and responsible leader for my community."

To conclude the interview, we asked Janet what she would have been doing had she not enrolled in university. "I am not sure," she replied. "I feel there would be limited hopes for achieving my goals. 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United Nations Affiliation

WFWP International became a "NGO in general consultative status with the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations" in 1997. This status has continued to be renewed based on the preparation of the Quadrennial Report.

Consultative status is granted by ECOSOC upon recommendation of the ECOSOC Committee on NGOs, which is comprised of 19 Member States. There are only 139 NGOs worldwide that hold the general consultative status. The requirements of this level of affiliation include:

- Applying organisation's activities must be relevant to the work of ECOSOC
- The NGO must have been in existence (officially registered) for at least two years in order to apply
- The NGO must have a democratic decision making mechanism
- The major portion of the organisation's funds should be derived from contributions from national affiliates, individual members, or other non-governmental components
- NGOs granted General Consultative Status must submit to the Committee on Non-Governmental Organizations, every fourth year, a brief report of their activities, in particular regarding their contribution to the work of the United Nations (Quadrennial Report). General consultative status is reserved for large international NGOs whose area of work covers most of the issues on the agenda of ECOSOC and its subsidiary bodies. These tend to be fairly large, established international NGOs with a broad geographical reach.

The benefits of receiving this status include:

- The NGO may propose new items for consideration by the ECOSOC
- Organisations granted status are also invited to attend international conferences called by the UN General Assembly special sessions, and other intergovernmental bodies.

WFWP International maintains a UN office in New York City. WFWP International has twenty UN representatives in seven countries: Austria, Chile, Ethiopia, Lebanon, Switzerland, Thailand, and the US.
