Title: Racism, Nonkilling, and Shared Humanity

Dr Balwant (Bill) Bhaneja is a senior volunteer member of the Board of the Center for Global Nonkilling, a UN ECOSOC NGO. A retired Canadian

Diplomat with postings in London, Bonn and Berlin, he has written widely on politics, science and arts. A peace activist since 2004, he is cofounder of the Canadian Department of Peace Initiative (now Canadian Peace Initiative), the Annual Ottawa Peace Festival, and the Center for Global Nonkilling. Other civil society memberships have included: Canadian Pugwash Group and Science for Peace. He is author of seven books, most recent works are: Peace Portraits: Paths to Nonkilling (2022), Creighton University and Center for Global Nonkilling, USA: Troubled Pilgrimage: Passage to Pakistan (2013), Mawenzi/TSAR, Toronto; collaboration with Indian playwright Vijay Tendulkar: Two Plays: The Cyclist and His Fifth Woman (2006), Oxford University Press, India; and Quest for Gandhi: A Nonkilling Journey (2010), Center for Global Nonkilling, Hawaii, USA. Since 2010, he is also the founding editor of the quarterly on-line Nonkilling Arts Research Committee(NKARC) Peace and Arts newsletter. Dr. Bhaneja holds a PhD in Science Policy from University of Manchester, UK and Masters in International Affairs from Norman Patterson School, Carleton University, Ottawa, Canada.

Title: Inhumanity is contrary to Ubuntu/Humanness

"If we have no peace, it is because we have forgotten that we belong to each other."Mother Teresa

The values of Ubuntu/Humanness are vital for harmony and essential for peace. Inhumanity is contrary to humanistic values articulated in the African concept of Ubuntu/Humanness. Ubuntu is a philosophy based on the idea that all humanity is connected. No one is an island of their own.

President of Nelson Mandela Day Australia and a Board member of the African Think Tank Inc. An experienced secondary school teacher and reader of the South African political economy and researcher on the settlement issues of the African diaspora in Australia. A former member of the Victorian Government appointed the African Ministerial Advisory Group which helped formulate the "Victorian African Communities Action Plan" (VACAP), which was adopted by the Victorian government in 2018. He is passionate about exploring ways of how the shared values of the African communitarian philosophy of Ubuntu that find expression at the personal, professional, and political levels can engender mutual respect, collaboration, and securing sustainable social justice for all in the diverse cultural communities. As part of the leadership collective, he helped organize the seven annual Nelson Mandela Lectures since 2016. In 2020, as the President of Nelson

Mandela Day Australia Inc, he collaborated with committee members

to stage the virtual Anti-Racism Symposium in Victoria. Recently, he participated in the virtual Truth Telling panel of three sponsored by the City of Melbourne.

Dr John Bellavance

Title: Psychological Underpinnings of Racism and the Persecution of Dr Moon

Dr Bellavance has worked in the non-profit sector for 40 years. He has completed his PhD in 2018 at

Monash University on the role of values in the use of Information Technologies by high school age children and has been teaching Information Technology in a Melbourne high school for 20 years. He is the Oceania Coordinator, International Association of Academicians for Peace, Vice-President, Universal Peace Federation Australia and Founder of drjohn.online fostering values education. He is one of the founders of Africa Day Australia and was Vice-President for five years. He is also a committee member of the Nelson Mandela Day Australia. In the 1980s, he and his wife Anne worked with the African American community to fight crack cocaine. Their efforts were recognised by the White House, were President Reagan sent him a letter of appreciation for his efforts to rid America of this social ill.

Richie Ah Mat, Chair, Cape York Land Council

Title: Honest and forthright recognition of the history and treatment of First Nations peoples in Australia is fundamental to cleansing our nation of racism.

There will be no true moving forward for our society until this happens. It is essential in our ancient country to repatriate historical misdeeds, for governments to empower First Nations people to manage their own lives and directly influence political decision-making. The time is now. Since Queensland Premier Joh Bjelke's repressive days to Mabo, the 1993 Native Title Act and the creation of The Voice, Cape York Indigenous peoples and their nominated leaders have led brave and fierce battles for land and social rights that have flowed through to other communities. We're only just getting started.

Richard (Richie) Ah Mat is a descendant of the Yupungathi peoples from western Cape York and the Wuthathi people of the eastern Cape

region. Born on Thursday Island, and later moving to Weipa, Richie led the Construction, Forestry, Mining and Energy Union (CFMEU Weipa Branch) in the mid 1990's against mining giant Comalco, in the fight against individual contracts. In 1997, Richie was elected as the Chairperson of the Cape York Land Council, an Aboriginal organisation appointed by the Minister for Indigenous Affairs as the Native Title Representative Body for the Cape York region. Richie held this role for 4 years before serving as the Land Council's Executive Director for a further 4 year period. In 2009, Richie returned to the role of Chairperson and has held the role since.

Richie is the co-chairperson of the Cape York Partnership group and serves on the board of Good to Great Schools Australia, Balkanu Cape York Development Corporation, the Forestry Industry Advisory Council, Bama Civil and Construction Services, Ngak Min Health, Cape York Girl Academy and Djarragun College.

Richie was elected as a founding member of the Prime Minister's Indigenous Advisory Council and is committed to the promotion of economic and social development of First Nations people of Cape York and across the nation.

Each year the International Day of Peace is observed around the world in September. The UN General Assembly has declared this as a day devoted to strengthening the ideals of peace, through observing 24 hours of non-violence and cease-fire.

But achieving true peace entails much more than laying down arms. It requires the building of societies where all members feel that they can flourish. It involves creating a world in which people are treated equally, regardless of their race.

As UN Secretary-General António Guterres has said:

"Racism continues to poison institutions, social structures, and everyday life in every society. It continues to be a driver of persistent inequality. And it continues to deny people their fundamental human rights. It destabilizes societies, undermines democracies, erodes the legitimacy of governments, and ... the linkages between racism and gender inequality are unmistakable."
