

Dr John Bellavance

Topic: Countering Polarisation, Breaking Down Barriers and Enlarging Circles

Dr John is a Global Vice-President of Sun Moon University (SMU), Oceania Coordinator for the International Association of Academicians for Peace and Vice-



President of UPF Australia

John shared the game plan for peace building based on the vision of its founders, namely, the six pillars of peace –

- (1) managing oneself
- (2) one's relationships with others
- (3) our natural environment well
- (4) universal values
- (5) interdependence
- (6) mutual prosperity.

These six pillars are the means to countering the polarization that exists in our world.



Dr Bruce Wong

Topic: The Importance of Shared Values in Fostering a Harmonious and Prosperous Society.

Dr Wong is an Australian entrepreneur and philanthropist, has journeyed from a Cambodian refugee in 1980 to a successful business leader.

Bruce highlighted the vital importance of shared values

in fostering a cohesive and thriving community. Reflecting on Australia's multicultural success and its accompanying challenges, he emphasized the need for respect, equality, and fairness as foundational to social harmony and economic prosperity in our global village.


Preetah Bolaky

She highlighted the pivotal role of education in addressing the root causes of conflict and promoting dialogue and empathy. Her message reflected on the Palestinian quest for peace, advocating for justice, equality, and a two-state solution as essential to global stability and a brighter future for all.

Not only was it a chance for WFWP to participate in helping the environment, but it was also a great activity to bring the community together and foster meaningful relationships.

Beach Patrol volunteer groups in Victoria operate across more than 40 postcodes. These groups meet monthly to collect plastic litter from local beaches, streets, and parks. Volunteers connect with like-minded individuals who share a passion for preserving our environment, wildlife, marine life, and ecosystems.

Romana, the head of Port Melbourne Beach Patrol, explained that the garbage found on the beach originates from stormwater drains and rivers flowing into Port Phillip Bay. When southerly winds blow inland, they push this debris onto the shore, resulting in significant amounts of trash accumulating along the tide lines.

Clean-up bags are emptied into appropriate garbage and recycle bins that Council has placed along the beach walking paths. Bags are taken home to reuse next time!

This is a photo of the thousands of styrofoam pellets lying throughout the sand dunes located above Port Melbourne Beach.

Over time, plastics and styrofoam ending up at the beach break down into small beads which become ingested by birds and fish.

A study found that drifting plastic waste accumulates algae and gives off a smell very similar to the krill that many marine birds feed on. https://marine-debris-problem/ingestion

The event addressed one of the most prevalent social issues, mental health. There are still stigmas that prevent people from talking about mental health issues. Events like this help raise awareness and encourage individuals to be more open about mental health by breaking down barriers towards seeking support.

The focus of the speaker's talk was on self-care and moving on from trauma. Maries stories were insightful, sometimes amusing, and always captivating. Her strategies for self-improvement and the practical methods for overcoming trauma were particularly informative, especially as they were backed by her real-life experiences as a survivor of abuse.

'Let's Talk About It' was designed to foster a safe and open environment for

discussions on mental health, encouraging individuals to share their experiences, support each other, and take proactive steps in managing their mental well-being. Participants were also encouraged to prioritize self-care and seek help when necessary.

The event began with a WFWPI YouTube video highlighting WFWP's commitment to supporting vulnerable communities worldwide and promoting harmony and peace. NSW Chapter President Satomi Terasaka delivered a welcome message, emphasizing that inner peace leads to family peace, which in turn builds community peace. This collective peace contributes to national stability and ultimately fosters global harmony.

KEYNOTE SPEAKER

Marie Louise - author and program developer of Discover World With **Topic**: Healing and Recovery



Marie Louise has guided thousands of people worldwide in areas such as trauma, mindset, creativity and spiritual growth.

She shared her own transformative experiences, including long-term childhood abuse and her lived experience with a loving mother diagnosed with manic depression.

Based on these stories, Marie offered

profound insights into the power of developing a relationship with our central nervous system. Marie believed that this relationship is key to fostering a worldview grounded in harmony. Her presentation aimed to unpack limiting beliefs, embrace true potential, and align with one's highest self.

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REFLECTION FROM PARTICIPANTS

Marie Louise, is an experienced advocate who can teach us how to "live our own lives" and "be our true selves." She shared how to live in the present moment free from past worries and future anxieties by using strategic methods such as physical activities and meditation.



Marie also conveyed a powerful message: "Before you fill others' cups, make sure to fill your own first. When your cup is full, the overflow will naturally spill into others' cups." She truly embodied this wisdom, and we realised just how important self-care is in positively influencing others.

Her warm, healing energy touched our hearts, and we are so thankful for the opportunity to meet her and hear her speak.

- PRESENTATION OF RE-USABLE DAYS FOR GIRLS MENSTRUAL KITS TO PRIMARY AND SECONDARY AGED STUDENTS AT THE NEW HOPE ACADEMY.
- WORKSHOP ON FEMININE HYGIENE, AND THE CARE AND USE OF THE KITS.

Over a hundred students and teachers, along with representatives from WFWP-Solomon Islands (WFWP-SI), participated in a workshop led by WFWP-SI President Monica Longanimala Ilala. Monica acknowledged the partnership with WFWP Victoria, Australia, and emphasised the importance of the Days for Girls project, which promotes menstrual hygiene. The workshop demonstrated how to use period kits, empowering 84 female students and their teachers with education on menstrual health. This initiative aims to end stigma around menstruation, boost confidence, reduce the cost of buying sanitary pads, and enable girls to attend school during their menstrual cycle.

New Hope Academy's Principal expressed deep gratitude for WFWP SI's continued support. Two boxes containing 84 Days for Girls kits were received with appreciation by Madam Alice, the Home Economics and Science teacher. She highlighted the positive impact the kits will have on students and staff.

This project plays a vital role in advocating menstrual health education, empowering young girls and their teachers to manage menstruation confidently and promoting a positive attitude toward menstrual periods.

REFLECTION FROM PARTICIPANTS

Madam Alice, the Home Economics and Science teacher, expressed heartfelt gratitude to WFWP-SI for the invaluable Days for Girls packs, calling them a meaningful gift. She extended her thanks to WFWP Australia for their donation, noting that these kits will greatly benefit both female students and teachers by helping to reduce costs.

With the high cost of living in the Solomon Islands, allocating funds for necessities like sanitary products can be challenging. The Days for Girls kits provide much-needed relief and support for the girls and staff at the school.





The key event objectives of the Tok Stori Conference were:

- Strengthening partnerships and enhance collaboration between NGOs, CSOs, Government, and development partners to foster a unified approach to addressing community needs and challenges.
- Promoting local voices to provide a space for different CSOs/NGOs to share their experiences, insights, and challenges.
- Capacity building: to foster partnerships and equip organisations with the knowledge and tools needed for effective community development, climate action, gender equality, disability inclusion, and sustainable development initiatives.
- Action-oriented discussions: to identify priority areas for collective action and develop practical strategies for grassroots implementation, advancing sustainable development goals in the Solomon Islands.



HIGHLIGHTS



The event gathered nearly 200 participants from various NGOs and CSOs in the Solomon Islands, including WFWP-Solomon Islands, represented by President Monica Ilala Longanimala, Secretary Joyce Warousu, Advisor Alice Houanihau, and Acting President of DSC/Guadalcanal Women Council. UPF Solomon Islands President, Mr. Peter Houanihau, also attended.

The key takeaway from the conference was the exchange of experiences, knowledge, and skills among NGOs and CSOs, fostering stronger networks to achieve shared sustainable development goals for the Solomon Islands and the wider Pacific region.

The event was a significant gathering of Civil Societies, NGOs, Community-Based Organisations (CBOs), Church Faith Organizations (CFOs), people with disabilities, and youth representatives from various fields.

Participants shared success stories and challenges, strengthening partnerships and fostering collaboration between NGOs, CSOs, government, and development



partners. The event also provided an excellent opportunity to build capacity, enhance partnerships, and expand networks.

Barefoot Architect brings Sustainable Housing to Pakistan's poor

Summary Yasmeen Lari, known as the "barefoot architect." has dedicated her career providing sustainable housing solutions for Pakistan's poorest communities. After career successful designing modern architecture, Lari shifted her focus to creating friendly environmentally disaster-relief dwellings for those affected by earthquakes and flooding.

Lari founded Barefoot Social Architecture (BASA) and the Heritage Foundation of Pakistan to preserve architectural heritage and address disaster relief housing needs. Her approach emphasises using locally sourced, renewable materials and incorporating traditional techniques, following the motto "low-to-no cost, zero carbon, and zero waste".



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In response to Pakistan's catastrophic floods in 2022, which destroyed 1.4 million homes and affected 33 million people, Lari and her foundation launched an ambitious plan to build a million flood-resistant homes by 2024. These shelters are designed to be durable, easily replaceable, and constructed using indigenous materials like lime, mud, and bamboo.

Lari's work extends beyond housing to include the development of eco-friendly cookstoves that reduce wood consumption and improve indoor air quality. Her efforts have gained international recognition, including the prestigious Royal Gold Medal in architecture at the age of 82.



Through her innovative approach to sustainable architecture and disaster relief, Yasmeen Lari is making a significant impact on the lives of Pakistan's most vulnerable populations, while also addressing critical environmental concerns.
