Hello everyone, thank you all for joining my family today, we are all so grateful for your love and support.

I know my mother would be so happy to have everyone together like this, she really did love bringing people together, and fostering community.

She built so many friendships here by simply accepting you all as you are and never judging on a surface level. She could really listen and truly empathize with your feelings. Always seeing the other side of things and putting herself in others shoes. That was one of her strengths.

As I grew up, I noticed I would do that a lot with interactions in my life and I would tell myself I am overthinking things or that I have anxiety or that I don't need to give someone the benefit of the doubt. But now I realize I was just taking after her and trying to understand people on a personal level, just having basic empathy. And you know, there is nothing wrong with that! And it even gets easier the more you do it. If we all could empathize a little more, this world would be better for it. So thank you mom for teaching me to be caring, without me even knowing it.

Now we all know my mom was a strong woman. She went through so much, but I believe her answer to that would be very simple. She believed that everything happens for a reason and that we must have faith that every experience is meant to challenge us to be who we are meant to be. She really did. It's hard to believe with everything she went through, but she lived by this. The hardships in our lives and how we deal with them are challenges to overcome, not burdens to weigh you down. For some unknown reason, a hardship is a way to make you into the person you are supposed to be and if you can overcome hardship, you will be blessed for it. How you navigate that challenge is what makes you, you. If you hold on to resentments with self pity and anger you only poison yourself with more suffering and pain.
