Dignitaries, among them the Deputy Lieutenant of Hertfordshire Stuart Nagler JP, the Deputy of the Watford Borough Council, a representative of the Elected Mayor and the Freemen of the Borough of Watford, spoke and cut Her Majesty's 90th birthday cake.

The programme followed with a display of colours, dances and lively music from a great variety of communities: Chinese, Indian, African, Caribbean, Portuguese, Polish, English, Japanese and more. The international buffet satisfied all the hungry attendees. Children enjoyed a bouncy castle outside and various craft activities. Next door, in St Michael and All Angels Church, a model railway and an exhibition of the Royal visits to Watford was on display to the delight of everyone. In the vestry an interfaith discussion on 'How can Religion bring Wholeness to People, in the Families, Local Communities and the World?' brought together representatives from various faiths in an atmosphere of openness and dialogue.

Now should we have another Watford Celebration next year? Yes, said everyone and the Elected Mayor of Watford joined in and said: 'Yes, that is exactly what we want'. Even though we had a reduced committee this year and the sponsorships were much smaller than previous years, we managed to do it. On the day a great number of volunteers appeared and inspired us all with their dedication and great community spirit.
