Korea

The Korea team headed to Seoul where they would be staying for the next month and a half. Dubbed the Gwanghwamun Center, it is a ritzy four story high building located in a section of Seoul.

Getting right to work, the missionaries attended their first event the very day they arrived. A Korean missionary in the Gwanghwamun area taught a baking class, where those attending learned how to make egg tarts. With the addition of the American team, the center had a bright atmosphere filled with laughter and fun.





Wednesday was their first day of witnessing, and it was fair enough to say that they experienced a bit of culture shock from how different witnessing looks in Korea. Going out with paper surveys and clipboards, the team did their best to talk to those walking along the streets. With the intention of inviting them to American Culture Night, the survey consisted of questions such as "Who is your favorite American actor?" or "If you were to visit America, which part would you like to visit?" Despite being in unfamiliar environments, the missionaries quickly adjusted and invested wholeheartedly into their evangelical efforts.

On Saturday, they hosted their first event in Korea, "American Culture Night." Taking full advantage of their American identity, the missionaries introduced different aspects of America through icebreakers, presentations, and a game of Jeopardy. They were able to create a loving and welcoming

environment for their guests, and overall was a wonderful way to end off their first week in mission.

Romania


Ya-hooo!!
