"We put posters on the campuses that are considered key campuses. CARP members brought guests to the event. We were able to show the guests that we have a big, active community all across Korea. Because of the care given by spiritual parents, spiritual children were able to participate and enjoy themselves fully.

Mr. Woo added, "There are a lot of workshops we provide for college students such as, one-day and three-day workshops for outreach, workshops for core-CARP members (Divine Principle workshops, National Student Assembly, etc.),but college is a place for cultivating culture and the students are the people who lead that culture. It is my belief that these kinds of cultural events will help the students use their talents and establish good relationships with each other, more so than they could through a one-way lecture-style workshop. Most especially, through this type of cultural event, we can take the burden of mission work off our shoulders for a while and just have some much needed fun." He also shared the vision for CARP going forward: "Currently in Korea, we merged CARP with the youth department. Now it is called the Youth-Student Department. Our plan is not just to make outreach efforts on campuses but to also help the church revive by raising and helping youth plant a church."
