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Experts have referred to the growing collaboration of North Korea, Iran, Russia and China as the “axis of authoritarianism.” North Korea has a well-known missile connection with Iran and is growing closer to Russia and China. Iran's relations with Russia and China have also grown much closer. And now we have a conflict in the Middle East brought on by Hamas, a proxy of Iran. The elephant in the room is that Iran has proven its ability to enrich uranium to weapons grade, and unless we fundamentally change our policy toward Iran, the next Middle East conflict will be even more dangerous than today. And there is always a next time.
