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December Student Life Events Report

The Office of Student Life at HJI was excited to host two new events this December, concluding the Fall 2024 semester with a bang. Spotlight on Student Research, highlighting the dissertation project and findings of Ron Pappalardo, was held on December 7th at 11AM EST via Zoom. The Spotlight on Student Research series was created for the purpose of providing students with an opportunity for connection with other students at HJI, as well as for networking with students in a similar area of study. The series also seeks to highlight great work being done at HJI, which can inspire excellence and energize leadership within our students' diverse areas of influence. HJI's Open Mic Night was another first of its kind, held virtually on December 17th at 8PM EST. The evening event was meant to serve as a celebration for a fruitful semester, as well as a chance to reflect and decompress from a busy year.

The Spotlight event featuring Ron Pappalardo, welcomed 42 participants who were eager to learn more about Ron's dissertation work entitled, "The God Effect: Long-term Influences of Elicited Mystic Experiences." Ron was preparing for his doctoral defense, so he began with a presentation of his research and conclusions using a slideshow specially prepared for the dissertation committee. It is well known that Ron has been leading workshops on divine mystical experiences for some time, and his findings revealed how impactful they have been for participants. In his surveying, Ron found that over 90% of participants felt their mystical experience initiated subsequent experiences that have carried them forward ever since. Ron's work also revealed that mystical experiences can be explicit and unique to the receiver; he reinforced this finding with testimonials of God's unique and personal revelation to participants. After Ron's formal presentation, he invited participants on the call into a guided meditation followed by volunteer sharing of their experiences if they felt inspired to do so. Ron also addressed specific questions related to his project and findings. As of this writing, it was confirmed that Ron Pappalardo did well during his dissertation defense and will be receiving his doctoral degree this semester. Congratulations to Ron for his impressive work and diligence in supporting individuals of all walks of faith towards a real, authentic relationship with God.

The Open Mic night event turned out to be an intimate and cozy gathering. It concluded with the singing of Christmas carols and well wishes offered from participants, including some children who joined in on the fun. HJI students, Shawna Lewis, Athanasius Catalan, and Melanie Chaudhary graced us with song, with a group poll, sharing and scavenger hunt featured intermittently between performances. Shawna Lewis is in her first year at HJI, and even though she was unable to join our event live, she composed a combination piece reflecting on her time at HJI and her growth journey this year. Since her piece was HJI- specific, we wanted to give everyone a chance to enjoy it by listening HERE. We hope to offer another Open Mic event to kick off the Spring semester, as well as host more of our student leaders as part of our Spotlight series. 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
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Unification Theology and the Christian Tradition



On November 21, a Faculty Roundtable featured Dr. Theodore Shimmyo, HJI President Emeritus and Adjunct Professor of Theology, entitled "Unification Theology and the Christian Tradition." The event was hosted by Dr. Thomas Walsh, President. Steven Boyd, Dean of Enrollment Management and Student Life, gave welcoming and closing remarks.

Dr. Shimmyo has done extensive research on theological teachings that are essential to not only Unificationism but to the wider Christian tradition as well; for example, the Doctrine of God, the Trinity, the Fall, Christology, Salvation, Providential History, and the Providence of True Parents. Dr. Shimmyo will soon publish, with HJI Press, a book entitled *Unification Theology and the Christian Tradition*. This webinar provided an opportunity for all of us to get a preview of the content of Dr. Shimmyo's forthcoming publication.

Dr. Shimmyo shared that "much of traditional Christian theology has not been able to confidently talk about complete unity between God and creation. God, considered to be a perfect and infinite God, is quite distant from and unmoved by the imperfect and finite world of creation. Therefore many unsolvable difficult theological issues have arisen in Christian theology. By contrast, Unification theology has a conceptuality of complete unity between God and creation." It is on that basis that Dr. Shimmyo believes Unification theology is able to provide solutions to address difficult issues. An important view he shares is that, "while providing solutions however, Unification theology appreciatively deals with Christian theologies' accomplishments."

The presentation was followed by an informative Q&A session.

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








The Religions of South Africa: Chosen People and Promised Lands



On October 29, a Faculty Roundtable was held with Dr. Ronald Brown, Adjunct Professor in World Religions, entitled "The Religions of South Africa: Chosen People and Promised Lands." The event was hosted by Dr. Thomas Walsh, President. Mika Deshotel, Associate Dean of Student Life, gave welcoming and closing remarks.

Dr. Brown lived for extended periods of time in various countries around the world, and experienced most world religions firsthand. As recently as July and August of 2024, he spent time in South Africa, Zimbabwe, and Namibia.

Dr. Brown shared his expertise on the religious landscape in South Africa, following the collapse of Apartheid. He discussed the effects of the Apartheid on society and religions. He presented on the evolution of chosen peoples and promised lands, which is central to the identity and various races in South Africa, as well as Jesus and his approach to chosen people and promised lands. "The idea that has really inspired the Africans and most of the religions in South Africa is the idea that certain people are chosen and they are given a promised land. [...] This is a common pattern in the study of world religions." Furthermore, Dr. Brown examined *Nederlands Hervormde Kerk* in South Africa, the emergence of African Zionist churches, and the spread of African Zionist churches. This religion "has become the prevailing religious identity of Southern Africa, which makes it very different from other places in Africa."

The presentation was followed by a stimulating Q&A session.

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












Student Spotlight – Sancha Samara Ogden Christian
