



The Road to Peace in the Middle East



he roadmaps of the twentieth century contained many holes and detours, observed Rt. Rev. Riah Abu El-Assal, former Anglican Bishop of Jerusalem. But, he asked, "Who gives whose land?

The partitioning of the Holy Land, in my mind, is the root cause of the pain and suffering of both people who claim that land as their own land."

Participants offered their perspectives on the US role in the Middle East: "When America pro-

motes justice it brings hope to the world, not when it promotes unfairness and hatred," said Imam Mohammad Ali Elahi, founder of the Islamic House of Wisdom in Detroit, Michigan. The Iranian native said, "We love the America of diver-

sity and respect." He hopes to help dispel ignorance about his native Iran, which he described as a country of pluralism where churches and synagogues are operating freely.

ormer US Congressman Rev. Walter Fauntroy gave several pieces of advice from his years of civil rights work with Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr.: "Tell the truth with love, and face reality with courage. Religious leaders should be

headlights [on the road to peace], not tail lights. Be thermostats, who set the temperature, not thermometers, who merely measure it." He described Jews, Christians and Muslims as members of the "Abraham federation."

Former head of the US mission to Irag. Ambassador Ed Peck said that nations and governments always act according to what they perceive to be in their best interest. Thus, he said, people working for peace should keep in mind that the road is long and they need the stamina to sustain their efforts: "You have to understand the size of the rock that you, like Sisyphus, are pushing up to the top of the mountain. The work is almost impossible, but we must keep trying.

I am very impressed with this effort and am honored to be associated with you."

"With the moral authority as spiritual leaders of every race, creed and color, we can build trust among those who distrust each other." said Rev.

"If you believe it, act on it," he said. "If you are praying, give feet to your prayers."

Dr. Chang Shik Yang, chairman of the American Clergy Leadership Conference (ACLC) opened with a call for people to embody the highest ideals of love, family and faith found in the world's religious traditions. He said "MEPI is building an atmosphere of trust and healing through an interreligious body of men and women transcending boundaries and embracing the family of humankind."

The Middle East Peace Initiative (MEPI) is a global effort by 11,000 Ambassadors for Peace who come from 147 nations every other month to join hands with Jews, Christians and Muslims of the Holy Land to bring an end to violence.

Our Ambassadors for Peace are current and former heads of state, members of parliament, religious and NGO leaders, women and youth leaders who engage in dialogue in the Middle East and bring a powerful impact back to their parliaments so that each nation can contribute to peace.

tions and churches to honor exemplary parents and to encourage families everywhere to invest in our most precious resource - our children. Among the most popular of these activities has been the recognition of outstanding couples as parental role models who have been honored as "Parents of the Year" at the national, state, local and church level.


Character Education Cable Show in Los Angeles
